## Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

### 1. Description of the Property

President Ronald W. Reagan's first boyhood home in Dixon, Il. located at 816 So. Hennepin Ave., was purchased in August, 1980 by a group of local citizens spearheaded by Lynn Knights of Dixon, who formed a not-for-profit corporation to preserve and restore the home. #1 See attached.

The Reagan home is a 2 story building on a stone foundation. The house is very typical of the average american early twentieth century homes in design, materials used, room lay-out, woodwork - door and window frames, etc. built in 1891. Typically the house has a porch across the entire front of the house which was enclosed with spindles and railing about 2 1/2 ft. high. The first story was 3 - 4 steps off the ground with casement windows in the basement or more commonly called a cellar. The windows were double hung windows.

The original house had a gable roof shingled with cedar shingles. Presently there are asbestos shingles on the roof which will have to be replaced.

A back porch was partially enclosed to make a bathroom downstairs after the Reagan's resided at the home and the house was made into two apartments in 1936.

On the opposite side of the back part of the house a new porch was also added after the Reagan's lived in the house. This porch will be removed.

The interior of the house has a front entry hall with stairs leading to bedrooms upstairs. The hall opens into the front parlor on the left and into the dining room straight ahead. See drawings.

The walls and ceilings downstairs are lath and plaster - the 2 living rooms and dining room have good hardwood floors.

When the house was made into 2 apartments the sliding doors between the dining room and living room and the hall and living room were removed and false walls of plaster board and a single door were used between the rooms. The door going into the front living room or parlor was completely closed. Members of the Historical Acquisition Committee have obtained sliding doors to replace the missing ones.

There is a fireplace in the front living room which is completely sealed over. At the base of the fireplace are glazed tiles (shades of green) with several missing tiles which will be found to replace them.

In the kitchen a back stairway to the basement was put in when the 2 apartments were made in the house. The pantry off the kitchen was used for the stairway to the basement. The stairway to the basement was originally under the front stairway entering via front hall.

### 2. Structural Drawings

A local attorney and former classmate of Ronald Reagan, Mr. Edward O'Malley, has provided a structural study of the home and drawings of the present room arrangements, copies of which were sent to the President and his brother, Neil, who spent Christmas

day reviewing the plans to indicate changes in the arrangements from the time they lived there, and to show the rooms as they were and which members of the family occupied them.

3. Restoration Work to Date

Engineers from the engineering firm of Willett, Hofmann & Associates of Dixon, Il. have inspected the house at 816 So. Hennepin Avenue, and determined that the home is structurally sound.

An asphalt, imitation brick (red) siding was removed by the Helfrich Construction Co., of Dixon, Il. in March, 1981, upon receipt of a gift of \$1,200 for material and labor from a long-time Dixon resident, Mrs. Reva Albers. The removal of the ugly asphalt siding revealed the original wood, small-width siding, which was termed in good condition by the contractor.

The home's heating system was renovated in February, 1981 when a gas conversion unit was installed as a gift by Arnold Spangler, owner of Dixon Oil Company, and a member of the board of the Home Association.

Both inside and outside paint for the home, for purposes of preservation, has been donated by Mr. Jeff Stoner, a local retailer, owner of the Dixon Tru-Valu Hardware. Volunteers have offered to paint the house both inside and outside.

Wallpaper for preservation purposes is being researched by a wallpaper company and has been donated by Mr. & Mrs. Gerald Wermers of Dixon, owners of Wermer's Floor Covering. Professional paper hangers may donate time to hang the wallpaper.

Lumber has been donated by Home Lumber Co. of Dixon and Patterson Lumber Co. in Franklin Grove, Il. to be used in the repair of the siding on the house, the replacement of door sills, porch floors, railings, windows, etc. More lumber has been promised by other lumber companies. The actual work on the repair and restoration of the house to date has been done by members of Carpenters Union Local 790 in Dixon and Local 682 in Sterling, Il. All the time has been donated. Some of the men are older retired carpenters who are very familiar with the architecture of the house which was built in 1891. The existing garage was also torn down to make ready for the building of a barn with a loft where the Reagan and O'Malley boys (Ronald & Neil Reagan - Edward & George O'Malley) played together.

A local brick layer and cement mason has offered to donate time in order to repair and restore the fireplace to its original state when the Reagans lived in the house.

A local plumber has donated his time to remove the downstairs bathroom which was not in existence when the Reagans inhabited the home. Any needed work on restoring the upstairs bathroom will be done by this same plumber. Another plumber has put in a new water main from the street to the house since the existing main had ruptured about the time of purchase of the house.

The roof will need to be replaced with cedar shingles. An attempt will be made to

to get donations of time and material to do the job.

A tree of approximately 10 foot in height was donated by the Dixon Chamber of Commerce and the Men's Garden Club and Lohse Greenhouse did the planting of the tree.

Tapes made by Neil Reagan on July 4, 1981 are being transcribed. Original tape and the transcribed tapes, after correction by Ronald and Neil Reagan, will become part of the house archives.

An Architect, Mr. John McLane, Jr. McLane & McLane, architects, Dixon, IL. has been retained to work with the research committee. A Historical Architect is being considered at this time to work with Mr. McLane. Three architects have been interviewed but no decision has been made.

Well known Historical Consultant, James Hickey, has been appointed to work with the entire committee to restore the home.

Throughout this entire restoration procedure many committees made up of many people have worked diligently and with great care and concern through research in order that the home be restored to the state it was in when the Reagan's lived in it.

4. Furnishings

Actual furnishings used by the Reagan family are being either loaned or donated to the home. When articles of furniture or furnishings are not available a committee made up of experts in period furniture will scout for the needed pieces.

The instructional guide for the National Park Service is being closely followed in the restoration of the home in order to qualify the Reagan Boyhood Home as a National Historical Site to be taken over by the National Park Service in the future.

**Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)**

I. Ronald Reagan's Life in Dixon

Ronald W. Reagan, 40th President of the United States lived in this house between 1920 and 1923. (Grade School years) As expressed in his own words the house was associated with important events in his formative years.

When Ronald Reagan was 9 years old his family moved from Tampico to Dixon, IL. Dixon is 100 miles from Chicago and 10 times bigger than Tampico, his birthplace. This northern Illinois community in Lee County was to be his home until he was 21 years old. In his autobiography he said, "all of us have to have a place we go back to. Dixon is that place for me. There was the life that has shaped my body and mind for all the years to come after."

Ronald Reagan, his parents Jack and Nelle and brother Neil lived in Tampico, Galesburg, Monmouth and Chicago before coming to 816 So. Hennepin, Dixon, IL. in December of 1920. Jack Reagan had secured a job in the Pitney Shoe store in Dixon at the East corner of Commercial Alley and Galena Ave.

According to Volume #3, Register of Borrowers from 9/1/1916 to 7/23/1923, library cards, Dixon Pulic Library issued to Neil and Ronald Reagan on December 27, 1920, 816 So. Hennepin Ave., Dixon, IL.

In 1923 the Reagan family moved to 318 W. Everett on the North side of Rock River. The numbering was later changed on the houses on W. Everett and 318 became 348. (High school years) According to Volume #4, Ronald Reagan was issued library card #378 on July 31, 1923, listed his address at 318 W. Everett St.

Neil Reagan who was attending the Southside High School continued to go to the Southside where he graduated in 1926. Ronald attended the Northside High School located on Morgan St. between Brinton and No. Ottawa Ave. This school was demolished many years ago. A not-for-profit retirement home for seniors was built in November, 1974 and is named Heritage Square. Ronald graduated in 1928 from the Northside High School.

Graduation ceremonies were held at the Assembly Park Auditorium part of the Lutheran Church Chatauqua grounds.

The Reagans lived at 318 W. Everett until 1928. (High school days of Ronald Reagan) Property now owned by Leo & Ruby Gorman.

During 1928 Jack and Nelle Reagan moved to 226 Lincolnway Ave. where they lived until 1932. The house is still standing. In 1932 they moved to 216 N. Galena. (College years) This property was demolished to make way for a McDonald parking lot.

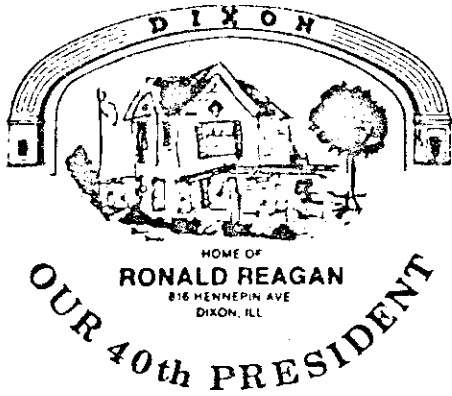

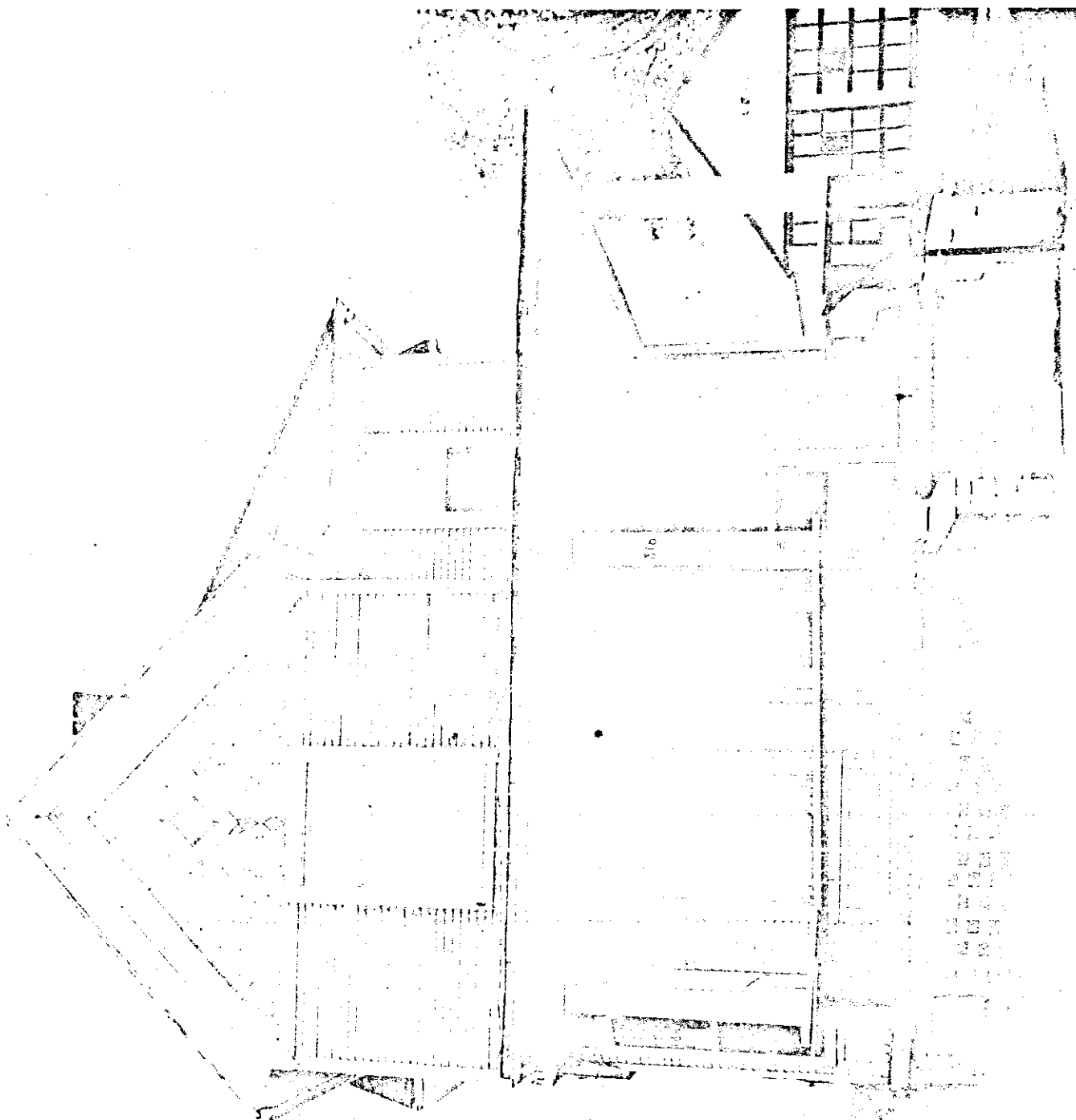

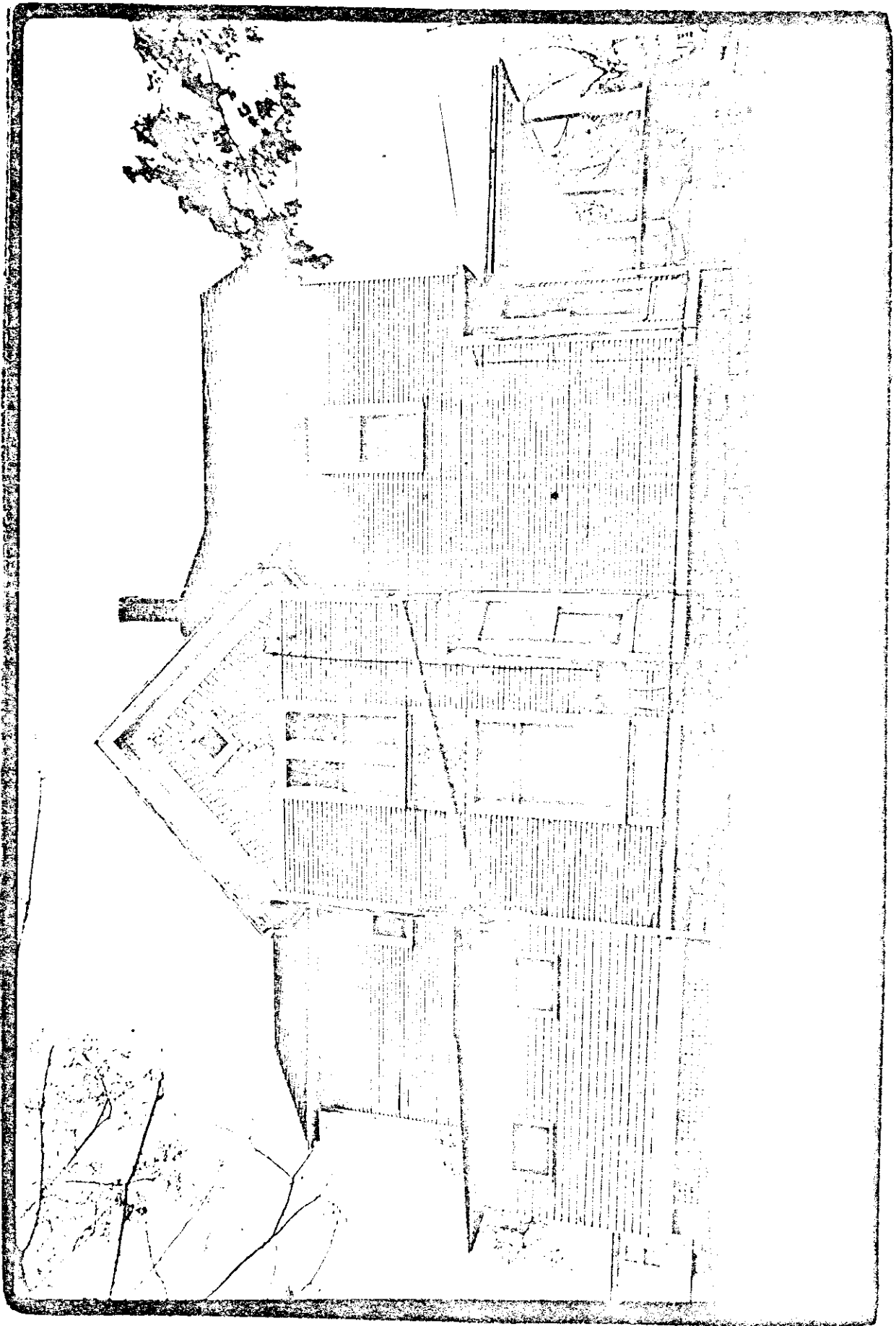
