DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Galena Hotel has four floors plus a basement and is constructed of locally-fired brick except for the first floor in the rear which is of native limestone. The north-facing building measures seventy-seven by forty feet and has seven bays across the front with the main entrance in the center bay. The lintels and dripstones on the first and second floor windows are of limestone and squared. The windows in the third floor are double-hung 2/2 except for the rear and the dormers in the fourth floor.

The fourth floor is under the roof and is illuminated by four gable dormers in the front and rear. The windows are arched and double-hung, but they are smaller than the others, with a single pane of glass in each sash. The dormers have been covered with aluminum siding. Other features of the roof are a skylight (which is original), asphalt shingles, and one brick chimney. The roof projects over the front and rear walls by about three feet.

The building has apparently been painted several times, but most of this paint has chipped off revealing the light red brick beneath. At the northeast corner on the ground floor there is evidence that some sort of structure was attached and removed in recent years. Although greatly fadone can still decipher the words Hotel Grand painted between the windows of the first and second floors. This was the name of the hotel from 1907 to 1962.

Except for the top floor the interior has been altered to the degree that the original floor plan is not recognizable. At one time there was a ballroom and a dining room but their locations are now uncertain. The top floor, however, is exactly the way it appeared when the hotel was built except for the floor coverings and an occasional coat of paint.

The exterior of the building has hardly been changed at all. An early photo dating from around 1870 reveals the presence of pairs of cornice brackets for each bay and small wood verandas in the center bay on the second and third floors. Evidence of these features is still clear on the face of the building. The photo also indicates seven chimneys on the roominstead of the present single one. This number of chimneys was required as a Franklin stove heated each room individually. It also appears that the original windows had sashes of 6/6 instead of the current 2/2.

An 1872 atlas of Kane County contains an engraving of the hotel that shows verandas extending the entire length of the building. Remaining evidence and the 1870 photo proves that these verandas existed only in the eye of the engraver.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In 1857 the Fox River House was built on Galena Street between River and Lake Streets. An early directory of the city names the proprietors as A.N. and G.W. (M?) Pierce. In 1860 the hotel burned down and the lot remained vacant until E.D. Huntoon purchased it to rebuild the hotel along the side of the once-important state road.

Huntoon operated the place until he sold out to George Dowling and/ or W.L. Dunn in 1871. A new owner changed the name to the Northwestern Hotel in 1888. The next record of a transfer of ownership was noted in 1907 when Mrs. Mary Jones became the proprietor. She in turn sold it to a Mr. Ward in 1912 who, apparently, initiated extensive remodeling of the interior in 1943 and changed the name to the New Grand Hotel. Mrs. Jones had named the place Grand Hotel. In 1961 the Koummoutseas' purchased the building and gave it its present name, the Galena Hotel. Mrs. Bessie Koummoutseas, now widowed, is the sole owner.

Aurora had become a principal milling and manufacturing town in the Fox River Valley when the hotel was erected originally. It lay on one of the principal roads in the northern part of the state, the Chicago-Galena State Road which had been in use since the early 1830's.

After Huntoon rebuilt the hotel in 1862 it soon became widely known as the best and most popular place for parties, balls, marriages, and othe social and political events. Although no evidence or memory of the heyday of the establishment remains, the hotel served as "a great social center" for over a generation.

Time, wear and tear, and competition from newer hotels have long since taken away the building's usefulness as a social center. The building retains, however, a certain dignity and still commands the attention of passerby from several streets in the neighborhood.

The Galena Hotel is the oldest remaining hotel in the city of Aurora and the vicinity. One early resident claimed it was "the first hotel in Aurora to amount to anything". It is near the center of the oldest part of the city and shares a block with several other old commerc structures, principally a tavern and a hardware store, which, taken together, could constitute a historic district if adjustments could be made in the appearance of the other buildings.
