### Description

The Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt House is a two-story, cubic brick Italianate house built circa 1860 according to local tradition on the southwest corner of Marion and Cooke Streets one block west of the square in Mount Pulaski, Illinois. Mount Pulaski is approximately 26 miles northeast of Springfield in Logan County, Illinois. The house is symmetrical with a low-pitched, hipped, wood shingle roof topping a wide eave line featuring paired brackets. The brick foundation has a three-brick course water table between the basement and first floor. The house has 29 tall, narrow, double-hung, six-over-six windows. Some of the panes still contain the original glass. The windows have segmental brick arches with wood sills.

The bricks came from the Van Hise brick factory in Mount Pulaski and are placed in a common bond pattern with every seventh row being a header row. The outside walls of the house are six rows thick creating 18-inch window sills which are made of wood. The only other wood is in the floor joists and attic framing.

The Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt House is surrounded by fairly modern houses except the house located at 207 South Marion which was built circa 1900. The lot at 202 South Marion slopes approximately 20% down toward the west. A brick sidewalk on the east and north sides of the lot has been uncovered by the present owners. The noncontributing building on the property is a two-car garage built in 1938 located on the west side. The garage is a wood frame, shingled building with the garage doors facing north.

The east side of the house, or the front, has a five-bay fenestration pattern. In the center of the first floor is a segmental arched doorway with a transom that has been covered with plywood and painted. The door is a modern replacement. On either side of the entry are two windows. Above on the second floor are five windows. All windows on the front have prominent keystones. Sanborn Fire Insurance maps dated 1893 show the house had a front porch. This was replaced by a modest gable roofed porch shortly after 1922. The porch roof is supported by two wooden columns on a concrete slab.

The north side of the house has three windows on the first story and four on the second story all having prominent keystones. The third window to the west was replaced by an exterior door during the 1950's and later closed in with brick.

The west side of the house, or the back, has two windows with a door to the south on the first story. The second story has three windows with keystones. The deck was attached probably after 1970 replacing a large back porch shown in Sanborn Fire Insurance maps of that time. The door is also a modern replacement. The deck covers an exterior walk-in entrance to the basement probably used for the delivery of coal. The brick stairs are now covered in concrete. A brick-lined cistern located a few feet from the back deck has been covered with a concrete lid.

The south side of the house has the only exterior chimney. This side of the house has four windows on each story with only the top four windows having keystones. Visible from this side of the house are two small arched basement windows.

The interior of the house is a simple four-over-four floor plan surrounding a central hallway. Door frames are wide with plain wood trim and mouldings. Ceilings are ten feet high on both floors except in the bathrooms. Floors throughout the house are 5" by 1" wood planks. There are no fireplaces in the house. Heating was by wood burning stoves with enclosed brick chimneys in each room of the house. Only the exterior chimney on the south side extends beyond the roof. The other three have been covered by layers of roofing material. Interior walls are brick with lath and plaster overlay.

Records of the house at the time of the original owners' death indicate a formal parlor and formal dining room. A library and kitchen complete with pantry comprised the remainder of the first floor.

The first floor hall runs the complete length of the house with the exception of a pantry at the end of the hall accessible through the kitchen. The pantry became a bathroom around 1960.

The staircase has an Italianate newel post and turned balusters. A basement staircase is located underneath the main stairway. The main staircase's balusters and rail continue to the east along the hall forming a balcony over the stairs on the second floor. The upstairs hall extended the full length of the house until another small bathroom was added at the end of the hall between the bedrooms about 1937.

Four bedrooms open off the hall on the second floor. These bedrooms were reduced in size to accommodate closets added probably during the boarding house era.

During the 1920's, the house became an rooming house with four units. It remained so until 1937, when it became a single family dwelling again. Remodeling was kept at a minimum until the 1950's when Albert and Charlotte St. Pierre purchased the house and opened a chiropractic practice in the library. The window on the north side was expanded to become a separate entry for his practice. Sometime after 1974, this door was filled in and bricked from the outside. The segmental arch and keystone remain visible.

### Statement of Significance

The Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt House is locally significant for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. It meets Criterion C for Architecture as a good example of a simple-hipped roof Italianate house. With its low-pitched roof, paired brackets, and arched windows, the house is a good local example of Italianate residential architecture in the city of Mount Pulaski, Illinois. The period of significance is circa 1860, the year the house is believed to have been built.

The Italianate style was a popular style in American architecture from 1840-1880. It began in England as part of the Picturesque movement. The style in America was loosely based on rambling informal Italian farmhouses..

Italianate architecture is summarized by: two or three stories, low-pitched hip (or sometimes gabled) roof with widely

overhanging eaves supported by large brackets (often paired), a cupola or tower, visually balanced facades, decorative bracketed crowns or lintels over arched windows and doors, and narrow single-pane, double-hung windows and double doors.

Italianate houses feature tall, narrow windows with two-over-two or four-over-four glazing. They tend to be arched or curved and many have elaborate crowns or prominent keystones. Paired and triple windows were also frequent. Cornices were wide and had single or double decorative brackets.

The Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt House has many Italianate features. The cubic, brick house has two stories, a low-pitched, hipped roof with widely overhanging eaves supported by paired brackets on each side. East, north, and south facades are symmetrical with tall, arched double-hung windows, many having prominent keystones.

Several houses in Mount Pulaski were constructed in the Italianate style as it was a popular style during the growth of the community. However, the Mattfeldt House has had the least amount of exterior alterations.

A wood-frame Italianate house with a side-hall plan located on North Vine Street has had the paired brackets removed leaving only the cubic structure and simple-hipped roof on this two-story house as the only Italianate characteristics left. Aluminum siding and a bay window have recently been added.

The two-story, wood frame Italianate house located at the southeast corner of Jefferson and Spring Streets still has the paired brackets under the roofline; the rectangular one-over-one windows have shutters. An addition has been added to the house at the back. The full-width porch has decorative wood scrollwork and columns. This house has a side hall floor plan.

The only other Italianate houses resembling the Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt house are both located on Washington Street. These two buildings have the same two-story cubic brick exterior with a simple-hipped roof. Both of these houses have the paired

brackets at the roofline and symmetrical arched windows. The house at 221 S. Washington Street has a three-sided bay window and a rear extension. The front porch has been removed. The house at 301 S. Washington Street has a c. 1910s front porch with brick piers and a rear extension.

Due to its lack of many modifications over the years, the Theodore H. O. Mattfeldt House is a good example of Italianate residential architecture in Mt. Pulaski.

### Historical Background

Mt. Pulaski was settled in August 1836 by Jabez Capps, a prominent Springfield, Illinois merchant and his family. Capps established the first store in town on the west side of the public square that same year. Christian Danner and his family, from New York, was the second settlers to arrive in Mt. Pulaski in 1836. In August 1836 Mt. Pulaski was laid out and surveyed by Jabez Capps, Dr. Barton Robinson, and G. W. Turley. Andrew Danner, a blacksmith, and Mr. Miles and Horace Roe, carpenters, soon moved to the fledgling settlement and roomed with the Capps family. The name of Mt. Pulaski came from the location of the village which was located on top of a hill and from various citizens who agreed upon the name of Mt. Pulaski. In 1844 a frame school house was built and a post office was soon established.

Lincoln County was organized in 1839 and Postville became the county seat. A courthouse was soon erected in Postville. In 1848 residents of the county voted to move the county seat to Mt. Pulaski which had a population of 300 residents. The citizens of Mt. Pulaski subscribed over \$2,000 towards the erection of a two story brick courthouse for the county. The courthouse still stands today and is a state historic site.

In 1852 the village of Mt. Pulaski was incorporated. In 1872 the city was incorporated under new state laws.

Due to Lincoln's more central location in the county and its connection to other cities by the building of the Chicago, Alton,

& St. Louis Railroad in 1853, citizens of the county voted in 1855 to move the county seat to Mt. Pulaski. Mt. Pulaski suffered a decline in its growth and by 1860 only had a population of 653.

The community became a popular milling center and grain shipper for the area's farmers during the 1860s through the 1880s. The population rapidly increased to 1,910 in 1870 and to 2,348 in 1880. In the fall of 1871 the Illinois Central Railroad and Peoria, Decatur, & Evansville Railroad came to Mt. Pulaski insuring the town's growth as an agricultural shipping center in southeastern Logan County. The population of Mt. Pulaski in 1990 was 1,610.

Theodore Herman Otto Mattfeldt was born on June 1, 1817 in Hamburg, Germany. He was educated in his native city and came to America in 1837 hiring out as a day laborer near Detroit, Michigan. Later he moved to Livingston County, Michigan, where he farmed for ten years. Mattfeldt was married in 1845 in Livingston County, Michigan to Emelie Baurmann who was born on June 7, 1819 in Hamburg, Germany. Emelie Baurmann came to America in 1840 with her widowed mother.

Theodore and Emelie Mattfeldt came to Mt. Pulaski in May 1850. He worked as a cooper for a year and then became a clerk for seven years Jabez Capps' store. In 1858 Mattfeldt was elected county surveyor and served three years. It is believed that Mattfeldt had his Italianate residence built c. 1860 in Mt. Pulaski. In 1866 he was appointed postmaster of Mt. Pulaski, and held the office until April 1869. He then opened a drug store on the south side of the square, continuing in this business for twelve years. While operating the drug store, Mattfeldt served on the village council for twelve years. Mattfeldt was a prominent member of the Lutheran Church and held many offices in the church.

Theodore and Emelie Mattfeldt had four daughters, Marian, Acelia, Agnes, and Amelia, and one son, Adolph. In 1881 the Mattfeldts moved to a farm in Elkhart Township, Logan County, Illinois. Theodore Mattfeldt died on January 24, 1884. Emelie Mattfeldt

moved back to Mt. Pulaski and died on January 30, 1886.

Upon Emelie's death the Mattfeldt children conveyed the Italianate house to Jacob Meyer, a son-in-law. In 1919 the house was transferred to Celia Zah, who administered the property until 1937. During this time, the residence became a rooming house.

In 1937 the property was sold to Henry and Ida Meyer. Henry Meyer was a grandson of Theodore and Emelie Mattfeldt and during his ownership conducted a cigar wrapping business in a shed (demolished) on the back of the lot.

In 1946, Henry Meyer died, leaving the house to his wife. Upon her death in 1952, the property was left to her two daughters. Eventually, one daughter, Louise and her husband, Albert Awe, acquired the property and rented out the rooms. In 1953 Albert and Charlotte St. Pierre purchased the property. Albert St. Pierre opened a chiropractic office in the library on the first floor of the home. One of the north windows was reconstructed to make a separate entrance into his practice.

Paul and Virginia McDowall purchased the house in 1974 and sold it to Homer and Dorothy McKinley in 1976 where they lived until his death. Dorothy McKinley rented the house to various tenants including a beauty shop until the May 1994 when Dennis and Janetta Clemons, the current owners purchased the house. They are in the process of rehabilitating the house.

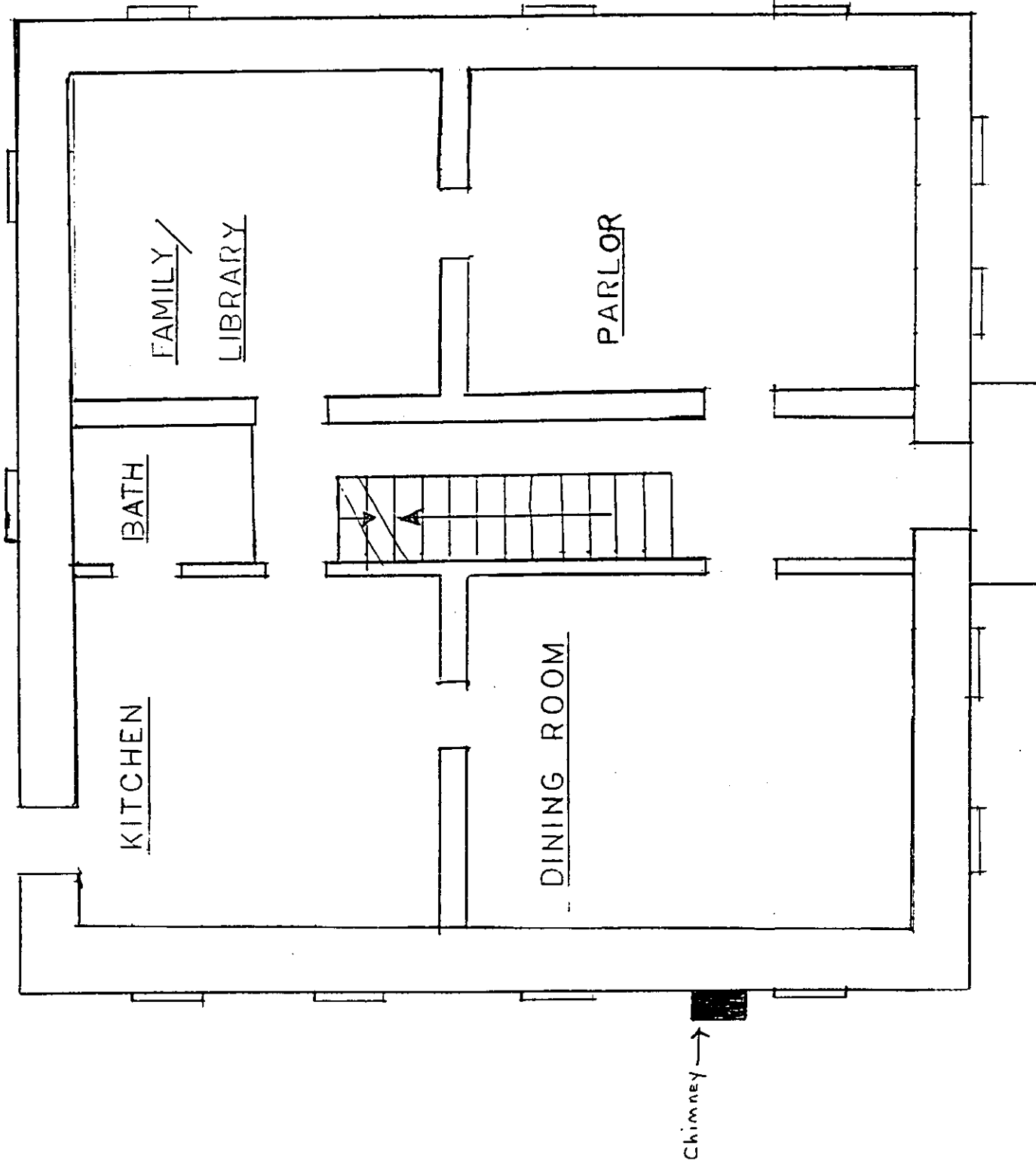
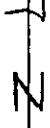

Theodore H. O. Matthews House

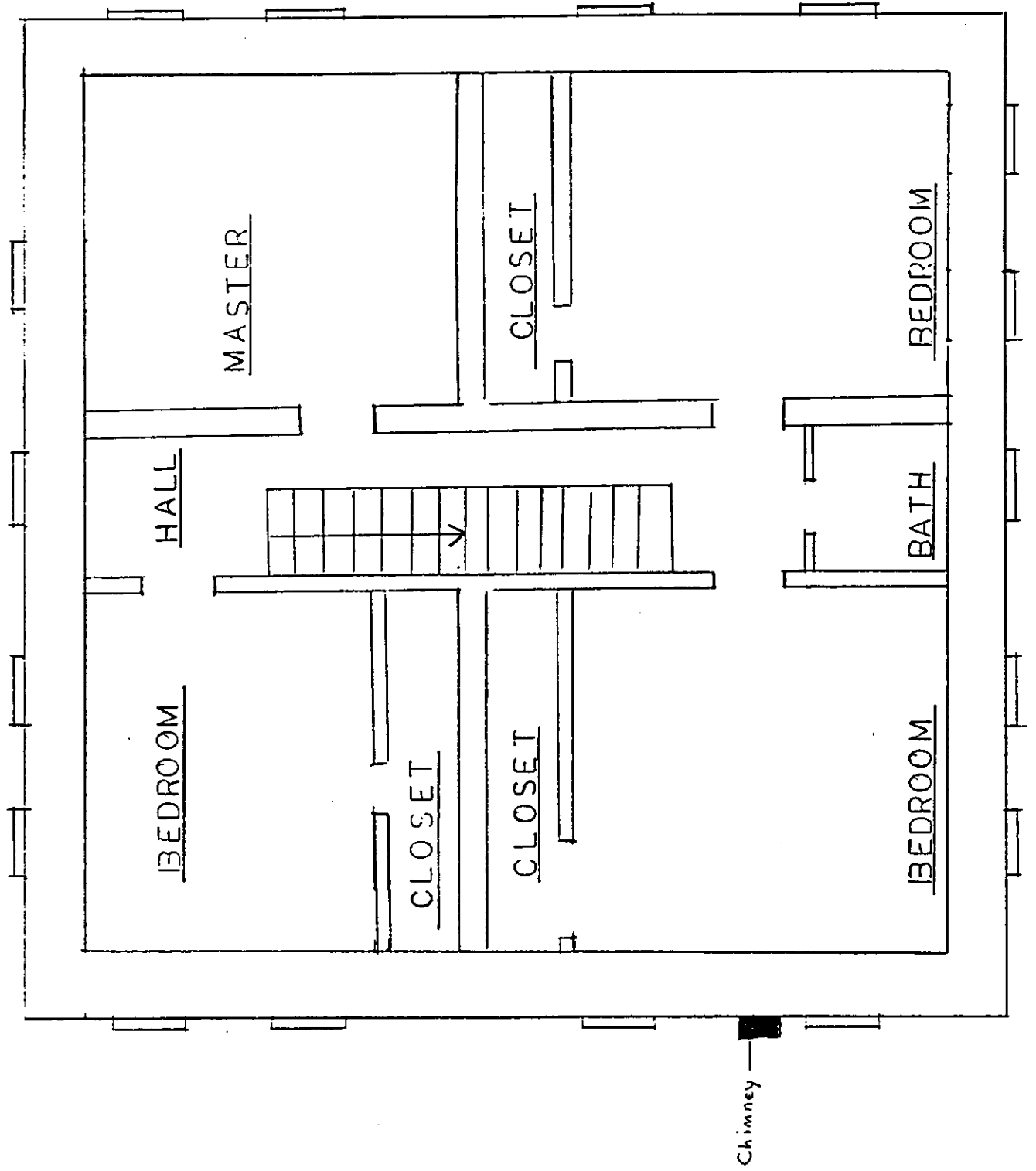
