Pleasant Grove School

## Description

Pleasant Grove School was originally constructed in 1856 as a one-room schoolhouse, located on a wooded knoll adjacent to an existing church (removed, 1951) and cemetery. The schoolyard is separated from the cemetery by a cement block wall along the west side (constructed, 1913) and a wire fence along the south. The original grove of oak, hickory, and maple trees no longer remains on this portion of the knoll and the schoolyard is open except for a few young deciduous trees and one large pine tree. A handpump-type well is located on the west side of the building. A wood outhouse remains off the schoolyard in the southeast portion of the adjacent cemetery.

The original 1856 portion of the building is a compact one-story rectangular form measuring 28-1/2 by 25-1/2 feet, with an eave height of 10 feet and the ridge height of 15 feet.

A wood-frame addition was added before 1900 measuring 8 by 8 feet of a similar rectangular form, enclosing the original north entrance and forming a cloakroom/vestibule.

The original walls are constructed of approx. 2 feet thick native limestone, laid in an exposed random ashlar pattern. Larger blocks were used at the corners, as quoins, and above the windows and door openings as lintels. Stone sizes vary widely, but the north facade wall units are of more uniform size and finish. Mortar joints are weathered, but those nearer the eaves indicated that the original were tooled, with a raised bead finish nearly flush with the face of the stones.

The roof and floor structure is constructed of wood. Records do not indicate who cut and shaped the timbers, but the site offered a plentiful supply of raw material. The roof is concealed from view by a contemporary lay-in acoustical panel ceiling. No access to the crawlspace is available. The roof eaves overhang the top of the wall by approx. 12 inches, without brackets or ornament except for a dressed-board wood frieze at the top of the wall with crown molding and the joint with the eave. A second wood molding runs along the bottom of the frieze at each gable end. Roofing is contemporary 3-tab asphalt shingles with metal dripedge trim.

The original entrance door remains, enclosed by the addition. It, and the door on the south that replaced one of the windows, are single 36 inch wide stile and rail doors with raised panels and a glazed 3-light transom. The exterior door of the addition is wood board construction with a glazed transom and secured by an exterior iron bar and padlock. This door is the only opening into the addition, which is wood framed construction with 4 inch beveled wood siding and cornerboard detailing. The addition roof is similar to the original building in overhang and pitch.

Seven of the original eight window openings remain, one on each side of the north entrance and three (originally) on both the west and east sides. The earliest photographs indicate these windows to have been six-over-six double-hung with narrow muntins and simple wood frames. The north facade windows have been changed to one-over-one. The west side, has three, six-over-six windows and the east side has two, six-over-six windows. The south side has no fenestration. Shutters of louvered type in early photographs were replaced by heavy, vertical board type in most of the later photographs. These shutters were held open by metal clips fastened to 1 x 6 wood boards run horizontally between the windows. These boards and clips remain, but the shutters have been removed.

The existing brick chimney, built within the northwest corner of the exterior stone wall, replaced (1913) the original, centrally located chimney (west of the ridgebeam), and the original wood/coal stove has been replaced (1920s) by the current cylindrical stove. The financial records of the school indicated the ongoing costs of fuel and stove repairs.

Water for the school came from a nearby spring, until the well was dug in 1860. Separate boys' and girls' privies, on opposite sides of the school, and the coalhouse built on the northeast corner of the school yard (1876) no longer exist.

The interior of the one-room original building remains, as well as the addition. The main floor is 4 inch wide wood boards which run the length of the room. The floor of the addition is poured concrete, nearly flush with the main floor level. The addition is equipped with hooks on the west wall, and shelves on the east wall.

The tile ceiling and plywood wall paneling cover the original ceiling and upper walls. A slate blackboard extends nearly the entire width of the south wall, and a stile and rail wainscot with flat panels extends around all sides of the room.

Electrical light fixtures are pendant oval globes, and were installed in the 1940s. The large windows with their deep window sills, and candles and/or oil lamps were the original sources of light.

Records indicated several pieces of equipment, such as the long "recitation bench," a cupboard built in 1860 by Joel Lobaugh, and the iron and wood benches and desks which have been removed.

## Statement of Significance

Pleasant Grove School is locally significant for Criterion C for architecture for listing in the National Register of Historic Places, as an excellent example of a stone one-room schoolhouse. Its period of significance coincides with the date of its construction in 1856.

Construction of rural school flourished in the Midwest in the mid and late 19th century as the land opened to settlement. Legislation to promote, charter, and fund public school such as the Illinois Education Laws of 1841 and 1845 aided the efforts of the settlers who had already started subscription-funded schools which were sometimes associated with their local churches.

Logan Township Pleasant Grove Cemetery Association, Inc., which now owns the building and grounds, is comprised for the most part of fifth-generation descendants of the original pioneer settlers of this area which was once called "Kimzey's Close" after the three brothers who settled near Pleasant Grove between 1835 and 1839.

These brothers, John, William, and Robert B. Kimzey, and their sister, Mary, and her husband, Hector McAlister, deeded land in 1849 through 1861 to the Methodist Episcopal Church on the Farmington Circuit on which was built the first church in Pleasant Grove. This c. 1850s building (demolished) replaced a log building, built in 1840, located "thirty rods east and across the road" from the present day school. The log building served as the area's first church and schoolhouse. Students came from within a four-mile radius, and usually went home for lunch. Support for this school was by subscription with payment to the teacher in cash or produce.

Most of the virgin prairie had been broken by 1850, and the area was known for its prosperous farms and abundant natural resources of trees, water, fertile soil, and outcroppings of limestone. Public schools began to receive local tax support by 1855 and the area's citizens made plans to build a stone school in Pleasant Grove, east of the church.

The new Pleasant Grove School was built in 1856 by Joel Lobaugh, a farmer and stonemason from nearby Smithville, using stone quarried south of the Pleasant Grove Cemetery. Mr. Lobaugh had come to Logan Township from Adams County, Pennsylvania in 1847.

The stone construction and workmanship of the building are its most outstanding features. The school is constructed of native limestone from a time of the earliest use of this material locally. The 1873 Atlas Map of Peoria County noted several stone quarries in the area. A study of stone construction and these stone quarries has not been conducted for the Peoria County area. The north facade, or front, features stonework of slightly larger, more ashlar stones than the side and rear elevations. Joel Lobaugh used larger, more square stones at the corners of the building which appear somewhat as quoins and help strengthen the wall intersections.

The foundation of the building and its walls are rock-faced limestone, random course. Dressed limestone lintels and window sills serve as the building's only ornament, reflecting no particular architectural style. Its native limestone construction is a significant representation of use of the material locally, taking advantage of a readily available and abundant natural resource.

Ashlar masonry of this type was used for buildings where permanence, ease of maintenance, and use of abundant local material were desired. A.J. Downing's Cottage Residences, Rural Architecture and Landscape Gardening, published in 1842 lauded stone as the preferred building material. Examples of its use on rural buildings include barns in Johnsonburg, New Jersey (before 1819) and Harmony, Pennsylvania (c. 1845). The building retains a high degree of integrity, with only exterior changes being the addition of the front vestibule, removal of shutters, and replacement of some of the window sash.

## Statement of Significance (continued)

No historic interior photographs exist, but exterior photographs indicate that the building always had exposed stone with flush or bead tooled joints. The photographs also indicate that the lintels and sills were painted in a dark color, contrasting with the light stone and light colored wood trim.

The 1873 Atlas Map of Peoria County, indicated that Logan Township had 1065 residents. This seems to be average for the rural townships west of Peoria. The Atlas included maps which indicate seven schools and several stone quarries in the township. This school is the last remaining example of a one-room school in the township. Only two other known stone one-room schools exist in Peoria County.

Rosefield Township, Section 32, North Eden Road near Doremus Road, approximately three miles north of Pleasant Grove School. The school property was owned by J. Yinger in the 1873 Atlas. The building was converted to a residence and is currently uninhabitable, with many changes to the roof, doors, windows, floor plan, and additions for residential use.

Trivoli Township, Section 4, Northwest corner of Route 116 and Stone School Road, approximately four miles northwest of Pleasant Grove School. This one-room stone school is currently used as a residence and has had extensive interior modifications and exterior changes to the windows, doors, and entrance roof.

The Pleasant Grove School served as a school from 1856 until 1946 for the area's residents. In 1946 the local Logan Township school districts consolidated and moved their classes to nearby Eden. The Pleasant Grove Cemetery Association, Inc. (members of which were descendants of othe original settlers of the area) purchased the school and a grounds at an auction in October 25, 1947. The Pleasant Grove Cemetery Association was incorporated in February 24, 1938 as a non-profit organization. It maintains and uses the building for meetings once or twice a year.

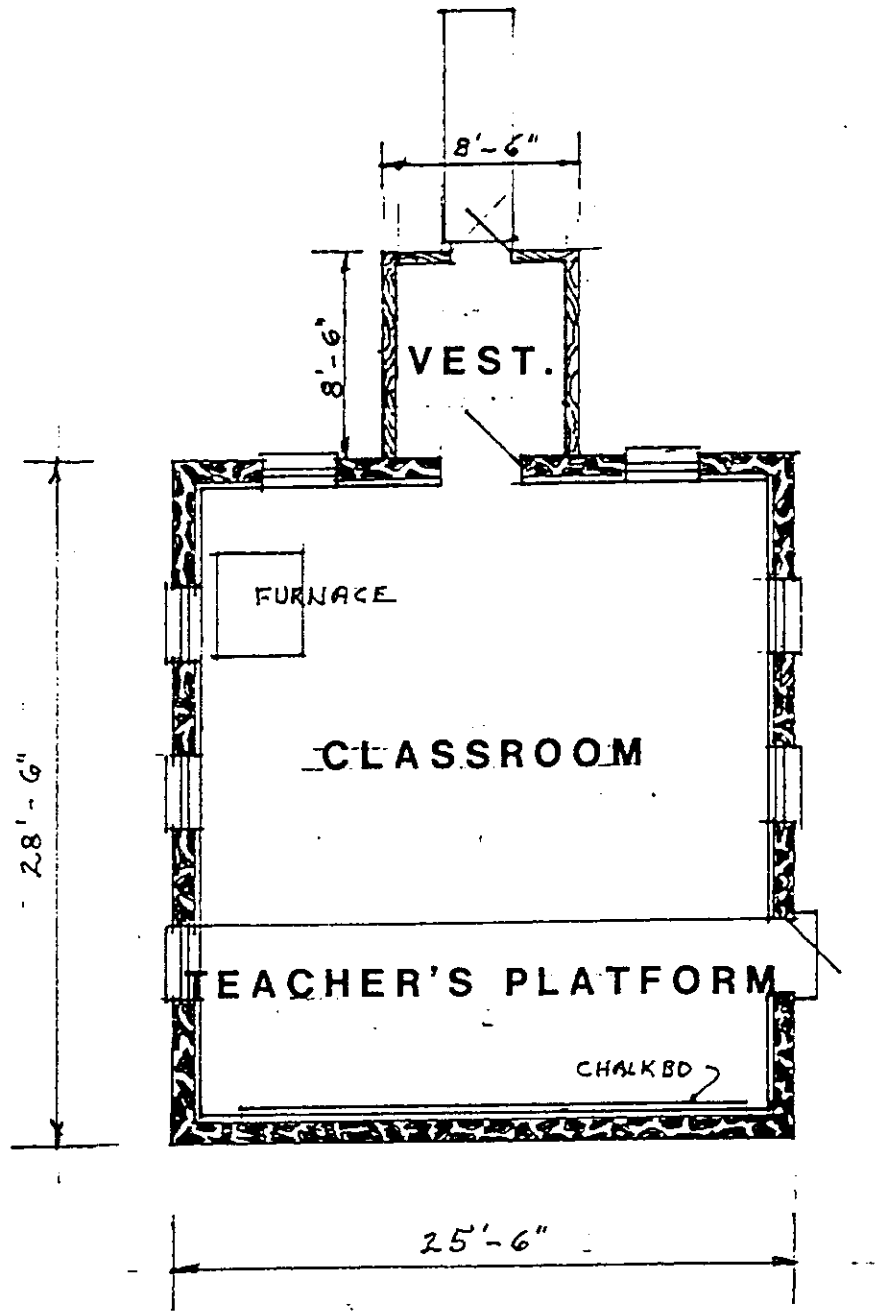

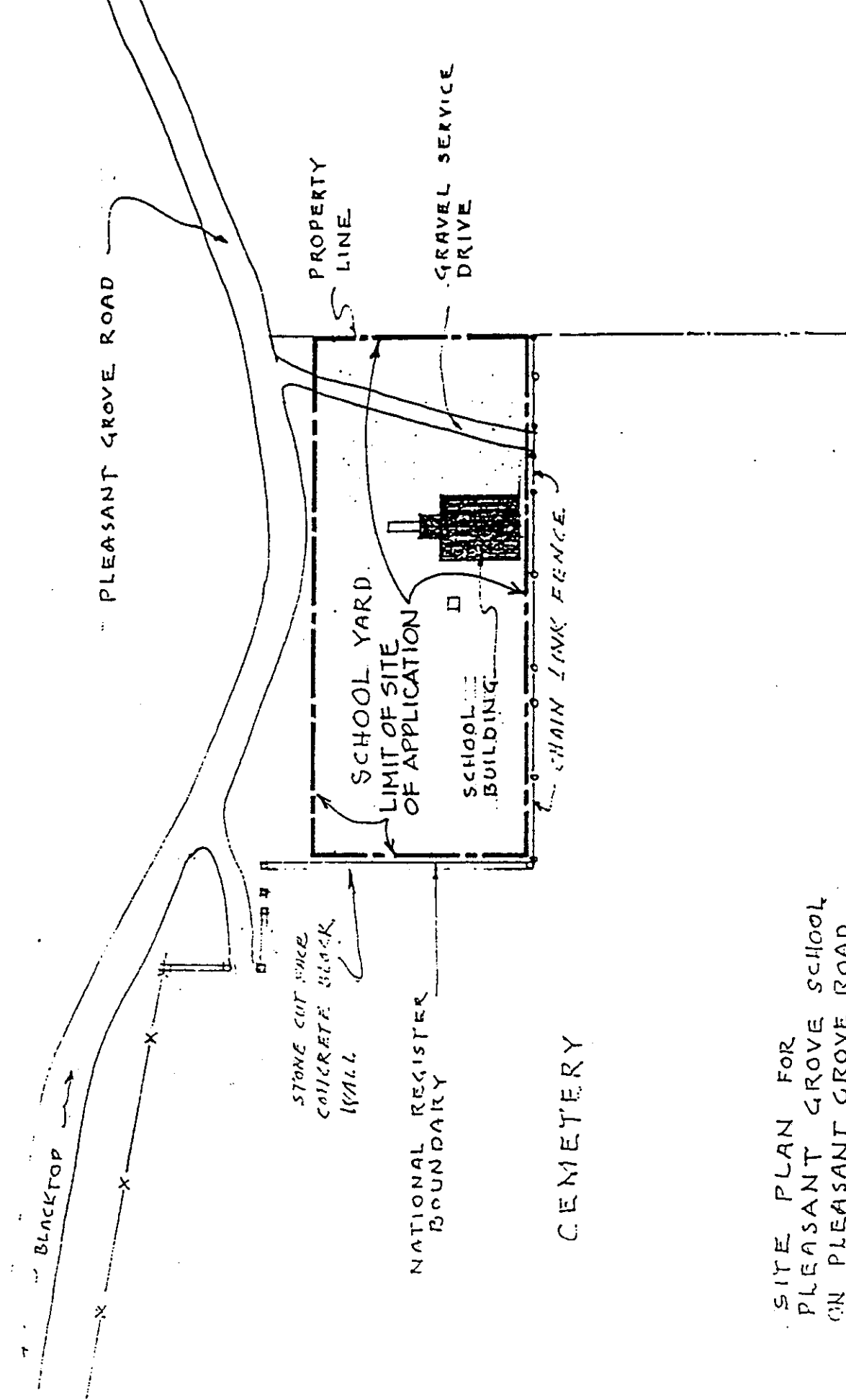
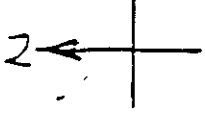
