DESCRIPTION

The Joseph Schertz House is a gable roofed, two-story masonry mid-nineteenth century I-House with Greek Revival features. With a northern exposure, it is located on the south side of Illinois Route 116 one mile west of the Metamora city limits and seven miles east of Germantown Hills. The house rests on a slight knoll set back from Route 116 about 100 feet. The approximately 1.8 acre site contains three outbuildings built circa 1940's. They are considered noncontributing to the nomination.

The Schertz House was constructed in 1862 for Joseph Schertz, with brick masonry walls approximately 14" thick and full size wood framing.

The I-House consists of four rooms on the first floor with two parlors in front, each with an exterior door to the north. The two parlors make up the I. The original kitchen forms a two-story ell on the northeast. It is believed that the ell was built at the same time as the I-portion of the house. The floor framing for the ell frames out in a third gable complete with cornice, fascia, and frieze. Also the windows are identical to the windows in the main I-house.

In the inside corner of the ell, a room was built and used as a dining room by early residents of the house. Because the exterior brick of this room appears to match the brick of the rest of the original house, it is believed that this addition was added by circa 1870.

In the mid-1960's a wood frame addition approximately 15' x 16' was built on the southeast corner of the house with a door on the west leading into the original dining room and a door on the south to the exterior. This room was used as a kitchen until the 1980's. It is now used as storage.

In the mid-1970's an open porch on the southwest corner of the house with a door leading into the original dining room was enclosed with glass. This porch is the present main entrance to the house since the driveway from the highway approaches the house on the west. This porch may have been part of the original plan because, in addition to the door leading into the original dining room, it also has a door, which appears to be original, leading directly from the porch into the west parlor.

The two modern additions to the rear do not detract from the home's integrity since they are smaller in scale and cannot be seen from the front.

The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Originally, the roof was covered with wood shingles. Three chimneys are still present, one at each end of the house, and a third one on the west side of the ell. An early twentieth century photograph indicates the house originally had a porch the full width of the front facade. It had wood railings and round columns with a Doric influence. A balustrade ran the roof line of the porch. This porch was removed sometime prior to the 1920's. The photograph also indicates that shutters were present but were also removed at an unknown date.

The northwest front facade now has a central small wood entrance porch. It is believed that this smaller porch was placed on the house circa 1920's. The porch roof is supported by round columns in pairs at each front corner. The roof line has a simple wood railing. A door from the second floor gives access to the porch roof. There are two, four-panel stile and rail front doors on the first story, one for each parlor. Each parlor has two, six-over-six double-hung windows on the front facade. The second story has five, six-over-six double-hung windows and a door.

The cornice and frieze run across the front of the house. The house has a low-pitched gabled roof. There are two chimneys, one at each end of the roof. The end gables face northeast and southwest.

The northeast elevation is the leg of the ell which joins the east gable end of the "I". There are cornice and frieze returns on the end gable. Five double-hung windows, three on the second story and two on the first story are on the northeast elevation. All have six-over-six panes. A wood single pane basement window set back in a wood reveal is located in the original house on this elevation. The 1960's, wood frame one story addition has one double-hung window. The exterior finish of the addition is wood horizontal siding with metal corner pieces and concrete block foundation. An aluminum sliding glass window in the foundation provides access to a crawl space under the addition.

The southeast or rear elevation has three elements. The end of the ell of the original house has a gable with cornice and frieze returns. A single double-hung window, six-over-six, is on the second floor. The 1960's addition abuts the first story of the original house and the first story window is thus closed off. This one-story addition has seven double-hung windows and an exterior door on the southeast elevation.

The remainder of the southeast elevation is part of the early modifications to the house. The dining room which was originally built in the angle of the ell was changed in the mid-1970's and a picture window with two double-hung windows on either side was installed where

two large double-hung windows existed. Also, the west side porch was enclosed at the same time with four windows on the southwest and two on the southeast. Wood siding has been placed under the windows.

The shed roof over the porch and dining room was added, thus blocking out second story windows on this leg of the ell.

The southwest elevation is gabled with a cornice and frieze return. There are two windows on the second story and one on the first story, all double-hung with six-over-six panes.

The enclosed southwest porch has a storm door and four storm windows. The porch has a brick foundation which does not entirely match the brick of the house. A cistern is located just outside the porch entrance.

There isn't any central present in this house unlike some I-houses. The stair to the second floor was built behind the east parlor and was accessed from the west parlor. A door on the south side of the east parlor leads through a small hall to the original kitchen on the south. Off of this small hall are two closets, one to the right which is underneath the stair and one to the left.

The south door of the west parlor leads to the original dining room which has since been converted into a farm-type family kitchen/dining area. A door located in the northeast corner of the original dining room leading into the original kitchen was covered over in recent years when the room was converted into the present kitchen/dining area. Two original windows in poor condition located on the south wall of this room was removed in the mid-1970's and replaced with one large picture window with two flanking double-hung windows mentioned above in the same opening.

A stair located at the northwest corner of the original dining room leads to the cellar. The cellar is under the two parlors and the original kitchen. There is a crawl space under the original dining room. The walls of the cellar are all brick as are the floors. The lintels over the doors leading to the various rooms are wood. The floor joists supporting the first floor are full width 2" joists approximately 14" on center.

The interior doors and door frames are original, with simple trim around the doors and four-panel rail and stile doors. A large opening with two, four-panel doors divides the two parlors. The horizontal arched opening and door casing have inset decorative wood panels. The floors throughout the house are wide wood planks. The walls have been repaired and some

have been replastered. The windows are original with the exception of the windows that were replaced in the south wall of the original dining room.

The fireplace, located in the west parlor has a wood mantel supported by a simple molding with wood pilasters. Each of the pilasters has a plinth block and cap that supports a large wood panel just below the mantel. The hearth has been altered and a new quarry tile hearth placed over the original hearth. This came about when the firebox was closed off and a wood burning stove installed in front of the fireplace.

On the second floor the stairway arrives at the east end of the house with a switchback hall to a large bedroom on the west side. The balustrades are original and of a very simple design. There is a small bedroom on the northeast corner of the house and a small room over the original kitchen which was converted into a bathroom when indoor plumbing was brought to the house.

The switchback hall turns north at the door to the large bedroom and gives access to an exterior door that leads onto the roof of the front porch, which is supported by four simplified Doric columns. The floors are all wide planks on the second story. The woodwork is very simple with only a slight molding at the outer edge. The six-over-six original wood double-hung windows in the house reflect the thickness of the exterior walls and have interior wood casings with inset panels approximately 10" deep. On the exterior the windows have stone sills and lintels.

There is a small wood frame chicken house located on the northeast side of the house, a wood frame machine shed building located on the southeast side of the house, and a corn crib located at the southwest side of the property. Dates of construction of these structures are unknown but would be estimated to be circa 1940. These are all noncontributing buildings to the nomination.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Joseph Schertz House meets Criterion C for architecture for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The house is a good example of a rural mid-nineteenth century I-house with Greek Revival features, that is locally significant. Its period of significance is 1862, the year the house was completed to circa 1870 when the dining room addition is believed to have been added.

Architecture

The Greek Revival style was popular from the 1830's to the 1860's in America. Archaeological investigations in Greece in the early nineteenth century aroused an interest in classical buildings. The Greek war for independence in the 1820's and America's un-British attitude due to the War of 1812 were other factors that led to America's builders and architects to use Greek models for the new country's buildings. Architects and builders such as Asher Benjamin and Minard Lafever published builders guides that spread the style throughout the country. Other architects such as Benjamin Latrobe, Robert Mills, William Strickland, and Alexander Jackson Davis designed high-style residences and public buildings in the new style popularizing it throughout the East Coast. Settlers moving to the Midwest from the East brought the Greek Revival style with them. The states with the largest population growth during the period from 1820 to 1860 like New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Virginia, Massachusetts, Indiana, Missouri, Tennessee, Alabama, Wisconsin, Georgia, Mississippi, Michigan, Texas, Kentucky and Louisiana all had numerous buildings built in the Greek Revival style.(1)

Characteristics of Greek Revival architecture include a band of cornice moldings and frieze across the front of the house, low-pitched side gabled or front gabled roofs, wide band under porch roofs, simple classical inspired columns at the front of the house, entries with transoms and sidelights, and horizontal sills and lintels. Greek Revival styled houses commonly have six-over-six windows and four-panel stile and rail doors.(2)

The Schertz House contains such Greek Revival features as the cornice line and returns, frieze board, stone sills and lintels, and six-over-six windows.

An I-house can be a one-and-one-half story or two story house, two rooms wide on the first floor, two rooms wide on the second floor, and one room deep. I-houses are based on traditional British folk housing forms and were common throughout pre-railroad America. After the arrival of the

railroads, I-houses became a popular housing form throughout the eastern half of the country. With the arrival of the railroads, local builders built I-houses with some stylistic detailing to make them appear fashionable. These stylistic details including wood and porch trim, decorative arched windows and brackets, became readily available to local builders through the railroads. Soon I-houses with Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Italianate or Queen Anne details sprang up throughout the country. The housing type remained popular to the early 1900's in some rural areas.

Most I-houses have simple side gabled roofs. Often the house is expanded with a rear addition making the plan L-shaped or T-shaped. Usually a porch is found on the front of the house the full length of the front elevation but some I-houses only have a small front porch at the front door or doors or no entry porch at all. In the case of some I-houses, each parlor had a front door. Two-story I-houses (two rooms wide and one room deep) were particularly favored as modest folk dwellings in the Midwest where relatively long and confining winters made large houses more of necessity than in the south.(3)

The Joseph Schertz House is a good example of the I-house type with its two room wide, one room deep plan, two story height, and side gabled roof. Most I-houses have a three-, four-, or five-bay front facade fenestration pattern, the Schertz House is a local variation on the type with its six-bay front facade fenestration pattern.

In comparing this house with other rural Greek Revival and I-houses in western Woodford County, there were three other examples found.

Approximately 1/4 mile east of the Schertz House on Route 116 is a 1 1/2 story brick house with Greek Revival details such as horizontal stone lintels and sills. The porch has been changed and the small second floor windows on the front facade have been sealed over. The entire brick exterior had a cement or stucco coating applied in the recent past.

An I-house with Greek Revival details is located off Route 89 between Metamora and Washburn on County Road 1675N. Details which remain include the frieze board, horizontal stone lintels and sills, six-over-six windows, and a partial cornice return. Some cornice returns on the house are missing. This two story brick house is in a very run down condition. The front porch has been demolished and an addition has been built on the side of the house which is also in a bad state of repair. Wood elements have not been painted and the brick is badly in need of tuckpointing.

Located about one half mile east of Germantown Hills on Route 116 is a two story brick house with Greek Revival details such as cornice and frieze boards and cornice returns. The house lost its front porch sometime back and has all new aluminum windows. It has not been maintained and appears abandoned.

History

Woodford County was organized in 1841 by a group of pioneers, headed by Thomas Bullock, who came from his birthplace in Versailles, Woodford County, Kentucky, and named the county and its first county seat, Versailles, in honor of his boyhood home. Abraham Lincoln was one of the early day lawyers who practiced in the Versailles Courthouse and later Metamora Courthouse.(7)

The county's affairs were conducted by three commissioners until 1850 when the present township organization was adopted. Worth Township, located west of Metamora and north of the Tazewell County border was organized in 1852 and was one of the most flourishing areas in Woodford County. Immigrants came from Germany, Alsace, England, Ireland, France, Bavaria and Prussia.(8) Most became farmers.

Joseph Schertz was one of the early pioneers in Worth Township having arrived in America from France in 1833 and settling in this area in 1835. He purchased the property on which the home is located in 1861 and built his home the following year.(5) In 1902 the property was conveyed to Mary Schertz Streid and Anna Schertz, daughters of Joseph Schertz. They immediately sold their share to their sister, Catherine Schertz Winkler, that same year. The house remained in the Winkler family until 1984 when the home was purchased by Peter Streid.

The Joseph Schertz House remains in excellent condition and is a good example of a vernacular building type, an I-house with Greek Revival details, built by local craftsmen. The small modern additions are located at the rear of the house and cannot be seen from the front. The integrity of the original house is well preserved with its Greek Revival features still in place, such as the cornice line, cornice returns, frieze board, horizontal stone sills and lintels, and six-over-six windows.

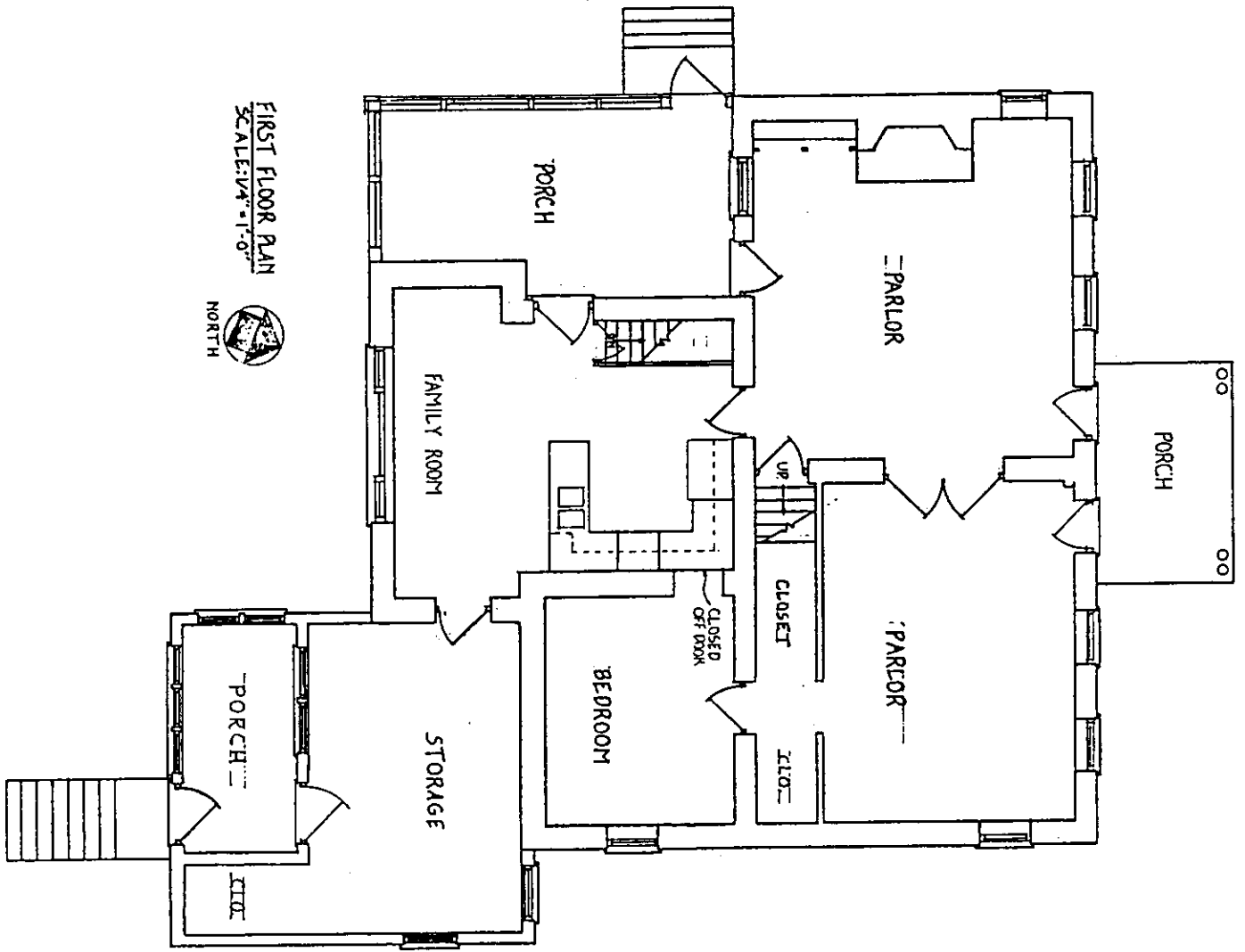

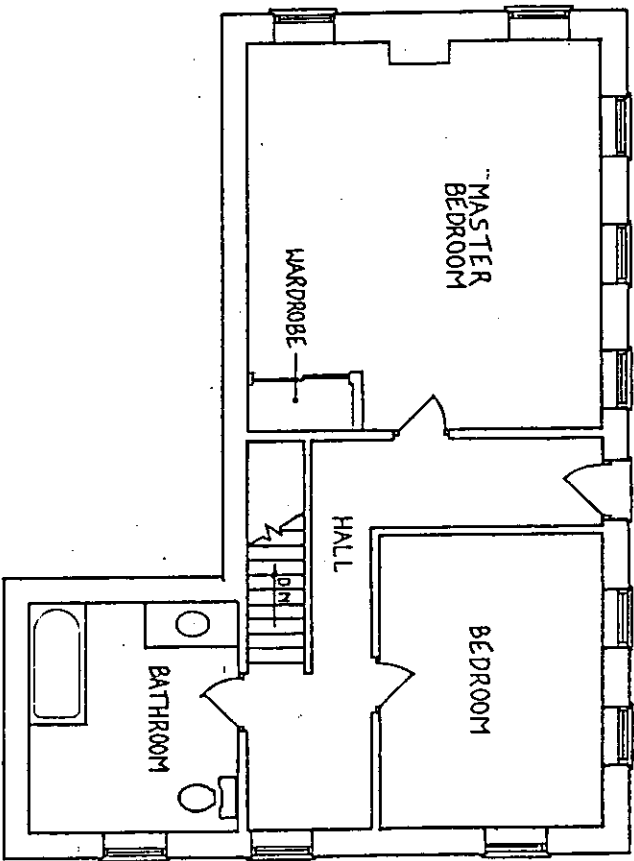
VERBAL BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

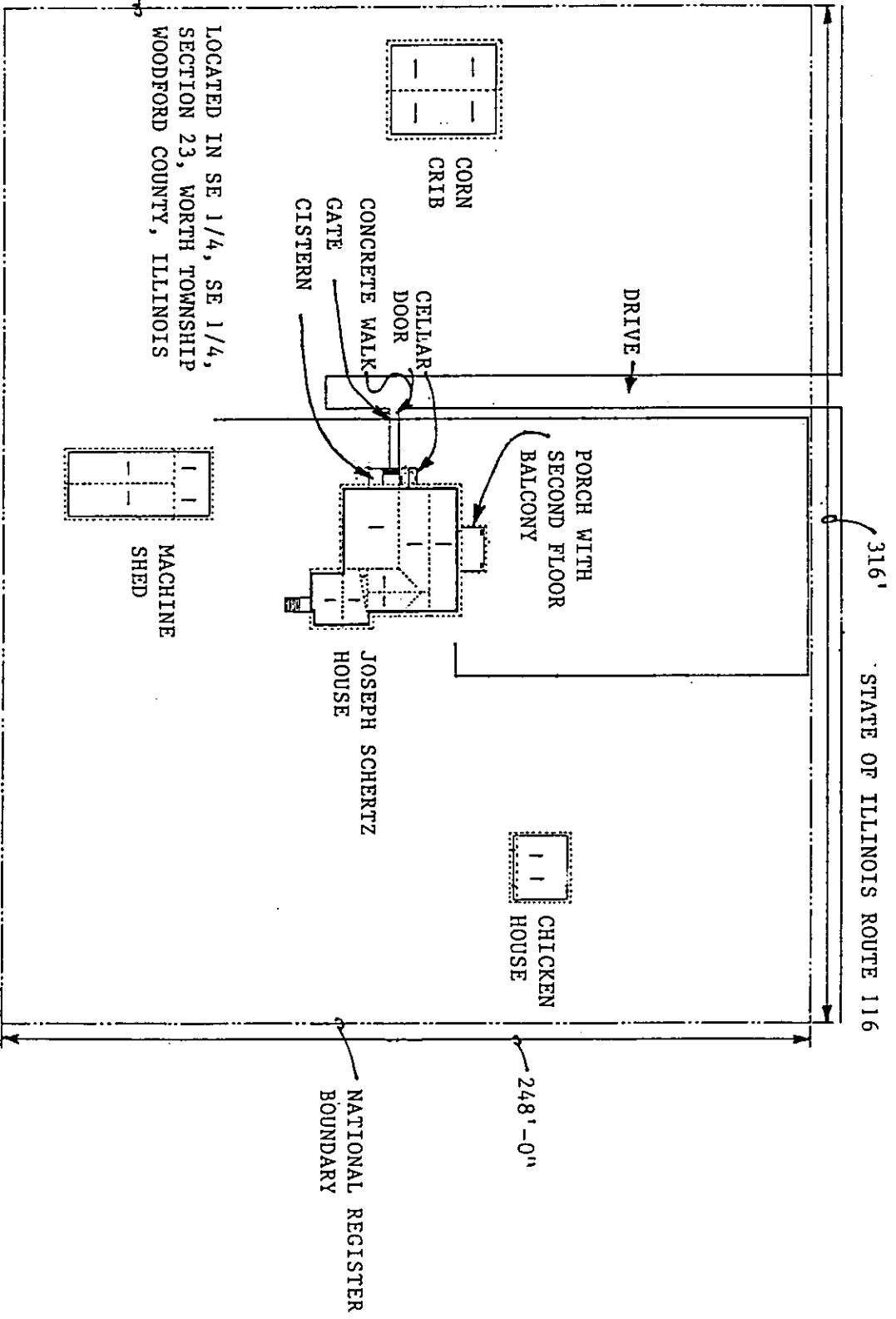


SECOND FLOOR PLAN
SCALE: 1/4" = 1'-0"



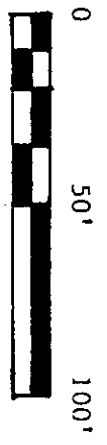
