Narrative Description:

The Jacksonville Public Library is situated one block south of the Jacksonville town square at the corner of Sandy Street and College Avenue, Jacksonville is located approximately 30 miles west of Springfield, Illinois. The library faces College Avenue and the entrance is approached from the North. The library was designed by the architectural firm of Patton and Miller of Chicago and constructed in 1901-02 by the contracting firm Menke Store & Lime Company, Quincy, Illinois. Construction was made possible through a generous donation of \$40,000 from Andrew Carnegie.

The library building is a two-story masonry/limestone/concrete structure with a ground level. The original exterior foundation walls are limestone with masonry or plaster back-up. The limestone walls are set in straight courses with a stone belt-course at the first floor level. Floor and roof framing of heavy timber encloses a cross-shaped floor plan which reflects popular public building planning schemes for many of the nations libraries.

The cross-shaped plan gives the building a symmetrical, balanced appearance. The dominant portion of the building has a hip shaped roof finished with clay tile. Two limestone chimneys are symmetrically located on the east and west portions of the hip roof.

The main entrance is located on the north façade at the top of stone steps that are framed by the presence of stone/masonry cheek walls on each side. The wood entrance door has wood framed fixed glass sidelights. Transoms with diamond-shaped glass panes divided by wood muntin bars further defines the entrance door. The entrance is protected by a classical portico with 4 stone columns of the Corinthian order. These columns vary slightly from the "true" make-up of the classical column in that the column height is just shy of $8 \frac{1}{3}$ column diameters. The column base is $2' - 8''$ in diameter, the column diameter is $1' - 9''$ and the column capital is $1' - 10 \frac{1}{2}''$ in diameter. The height of the architrave is the total of the freize and the cornice which together measure $3' - 8''$. The entrance is further enhanced by a terra cotta pediment that is $27' - 0''$ in width. The pediment is highly detailed with dentils and brackets that support a built-in gutter system. The overall height of the pediment is $6' - 6''$. The remaining area of the entrance façade is symmetrical around the centerline axis of the entrance and the pediment. The corners of the building are defined by the use of double stone pilasters that are $18''$ in width each and project $4''$ beyond the building face. The pilasters extend from the bottom of the entablature and rest on the belt course below.

The stone mass of the entrance façade is interrupted by the large fixed wood framed windows and transoms. These large windows remain as part of the original fenestration design and continue today to provide generous natural light into the principal reading rooms. These windows are copied directly below by smaller windows that serve to introduce light into the ground level of the building.

The west elevation of the building repeats the stone façade and due to the slope of the site there is an entrance into the ground level of the structure. On this elevation there is a stone retaining wall that allows for the exposure of a greater building mass. The window sizes and types are similar to the fenestration of the north façade however the windows at the mezzanine are seen on the west elevation.

The south elevation continues the architecture of the other exposures. Precast concrete panels match the coursing and color of the original stone exterior. The windows are one over one double-hung wood framed to reflect the window sizes of the original building design. The existence of a gable shaped parapet expresses the roof shapes of the other exterior elements.

The east elevation is an opposite view of the west façade with the same exterior treatment, the same window treatment and the same roof lines and details.

In 1995-96, the library board together with the Jacksonville Public Building Commission completed a renovation of the original building and a ten thousand square foot addition. The new three level addition is located south of the 1902 building. It is a steel frame structure with precast concrete exterior wall panels that match the existing limestone masonry. Stair towers on the east and west elevations are used as transitional elements between the new and existing building. The roof addition on the east and west elevations are extensions of the existing clay tile roof while the south elevation is a gable shaped structure. The interior of the addition contains book stacks along with stairs, elevator and ADA compliance restrooms. The cost for this project was \$2,212,910.00. The 1995 project was designed by the architectural firm of Frye, Gillan, Molinaro of Chicago, Illinois.

Interiors are defined as follows:

The main entrance on the north façade brings the visitor into a small vestibule air-lock and then into a larger vestibule area that contains two stairs leading to the lower (ground) level. Beyond this area at the first floor is the rotunda (dome) from which one enters either of two reading rooms or one approaches the circulation desk. The reading rooms each have large fireplaces with brick fireboxes and each is detailed with wood mantels. From the area immediately adjacent to the circulation desk there is access to the librarian's office and to a small meeting room.

Beyond the circulation desk is the juncture of the original building (1902) and the 1995 addition. Directly inside the south addition are two restrooms and to the west the primary stair which connects the different floor levels. Beyond the stair is the first floor stack area and located on the east and west perimeter walls are exit stair towers. Behind the primary stair in the northwest corner of the book stack area is a passenger elevator.

The second floor book stack areas are reached by stair or by using the passenger elevator. At the north book stack area there is a secure room designated for use as the rare book collection.

The ground level of the building is reached via the two primary stairs from the first floor or by using the elevator. Functions housed on the ground or lower level include a

conference room, tech room, children's area, story room, rest rooms, and stack area. The conference room serves as a multi-use room for various community and social meetings. A handsome fireplace is located on the south wall of the conference room. As was the case with the fireplaces located at the first floor reading rooms this fireplace was restored during the 1995 restoration/addition project.

The interior of the Jacksonville Public Library is accented with stained oak trim and doors, wood trimmed fireplaces, ceramic tile floors, plaster walls, wood Corinthian columns, and original profiled oak base boards. The floor of the entrance vestibule is ceramic mosaic tile with three risers and treads of marble. The dome area has been beautifully restored and the floor area beneath the dome is finished with ceramic mosaic tile. Framing the dome entrance are four wood Corinthian columns resting on marble bases. The interior is in excellent condition with many of the original plaster walls and ceilings repaired and replastered together with the ornate details of the column capitals.

Narrative Statement of Significance:

The Jacksonville Public Library meets the Criterion A for education due to its role in providing library services to the citizens of Jacksonville from 1902 through 1950, the cutoff date for significance to the National Register of Historic Places. The Jacksonville Public Library satisfies the requirements of the property type "Carnegie Library" as defined in the property documentation form Illinois Carnegie Libraries.

Jacksonville became the permanent seat of Morgan County in 1825. The village of Jacksonville grew rapidly in the beginning with farming as the principal way of life, then educational facilities, commercial enterprises, railroads, banks and saloons. In 1829, the first building was constructed on the campus of Illinois College. MacMurray College was founded in 1846. Jacksonville was considered to have the most complete rail service of any Illinois city except for Chicago. In 1867, the village was incorporated as a City and John Mathers was elected as the first mayor. Political interest was very strong in early Jacksonville and the City sent many men to serve in the State of Illinois legislature. The City also produced a State of Illinois Governor Duncan.

With the political influence, the City attracted several state institutions, i.e., Illinois School for the Deaf, Illinois School for the Visually Impaired, and a State of Illinois Mental Hospital.

The City's population had reached fifteen thousand by the year 1900. Over the next twenty-five years the growth slowed dramatically with little apparent reason except for the perception that Jacksonville was a city of culture, but not of industry.

The Jacksonville Public Library at 201 West College Ave. is located on Lots 164 and 165 of the original plat of the town of Jacksonville. The southwest quadrant of the original town was part of 80 acres sold by the United States government to Thomas Avnett on April 15, 1825, for \$1.25 per acre.

The Jacksonville Public Library began its history in 1870 in the home of Dr. T.J. Pitner when a group of fifty (50) members organized a "closed" library association. Dues were \$10.00 per year and the depository for books was a room in the northeast corner of the new courthouse. It opened on Saturday afternoons only. An attempt to open its doors began in 1874 when a free reading room was established on West State Street in a room donated by Colonel Chambers. In 1881, the City Council of Jacksonville passed an ordinance that it would take charge of the library and support it through taxation. The taxation was one mill which brought in \$1,700.00 per year. At that time the library was located in the YMCA and remained there until 1897 when the library had outgrown its YMCA location and was moved to the second floor of a building on South Main Street.

In 1901, Mr. L.O. Vaught, lawyer, corresponded with Andrew Carnegie in New York requesting a donation to finance the construction of a new library building. After several letters were exchanged, word was received from James Bertram, esq. secretary to Andrew Carnegie that Mr. Carnegie would donate \$40,000.00 to the City of Jacksonville for the construction of a new facility.

The architectural firm of Patton and Miller located in Chicago was selected to prepare plans for the new library. The "Classical Revival" structure was completed and opened to the public on February 23, 1903.

The firm of Patton and Miller is particularly known for their many library designs. The firm designed at least 80 libraries, 17 of them in Illinois with the remainder scattered in 16 other states. Among their library designs in Illinois were the Danville Public Library which is listed in the National Register of Historic Places, Freeport Library, Streator Library, Taylorville Library, and the Waukegan Library. The firm also designed the First Presbyterian Church in Rockford and the Music Hall at Milliken University in Decatur.

Upon opening in February, 1903, the library immediately began its role of community service. Meetings attended by the general public were common. The following are

examples of the types of public education/information gatherings.

- A. September 30, 1904 – Historical Society to meet in library.
- B. June 14, 1906 – Anti-tuberculosis league meeting of the Board of Directors.
- C. 1910 – Morgan County Medical Society meets at library.
- D. January 13, 1914 – Dr. Danner, Illinois College professor, lectures on Electus of Sophocles.
- E. January 13, 1914 – Vachel Lindsay (Poet) spoke on the art of moving pictures.
- F. December 15, 1915 – Vachel Lindsay (Poet) – poetry reading.

Throughout the period of significance (1902-1950), the Jacksonville Public Library served the educational needs of the students of the area from preschool through high school. Also many students from MacMurray College and Illinois College used the facility as part of their educational experience. The Jacksonville Public Library, has through its history, served the social/educational needs of the Jacksonville area. Architecturally, the building is an excellent example of the “classical revival”

style and the original cross plan reflects a planning concept that was favored by James Bertram, Andrew Carnigie's secretary and contact person during the early years of this century. As is, and was the case, Carnegie libraries are significant for their contribution to local education and social history in the State of Illinois. The Jacksonville Public Library is an outstanding statement reflecting the philanthropy period of Mr. Carnegie's life and is an outstanding candidate for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

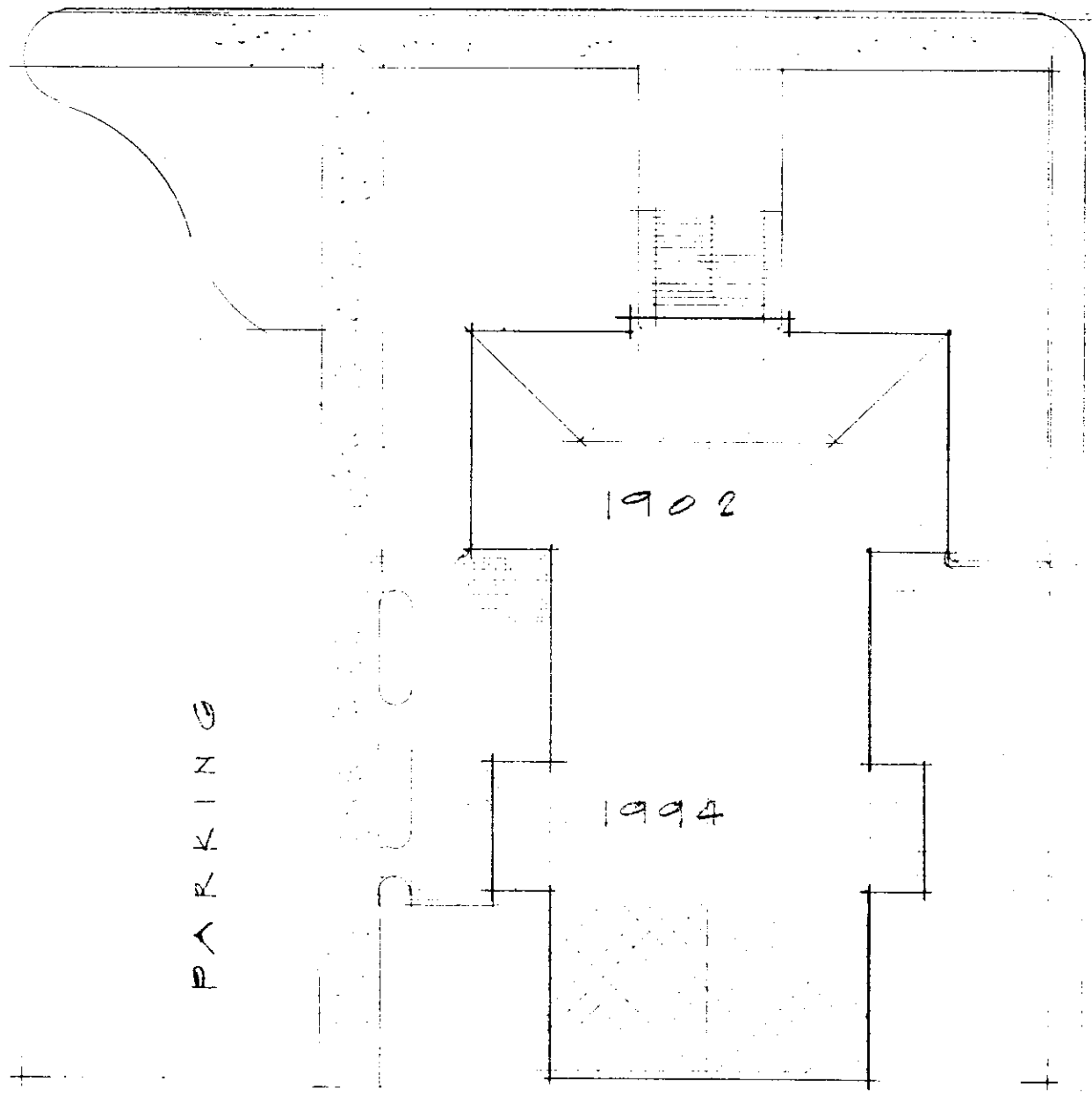
Verbal Boundary Description:

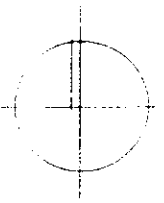


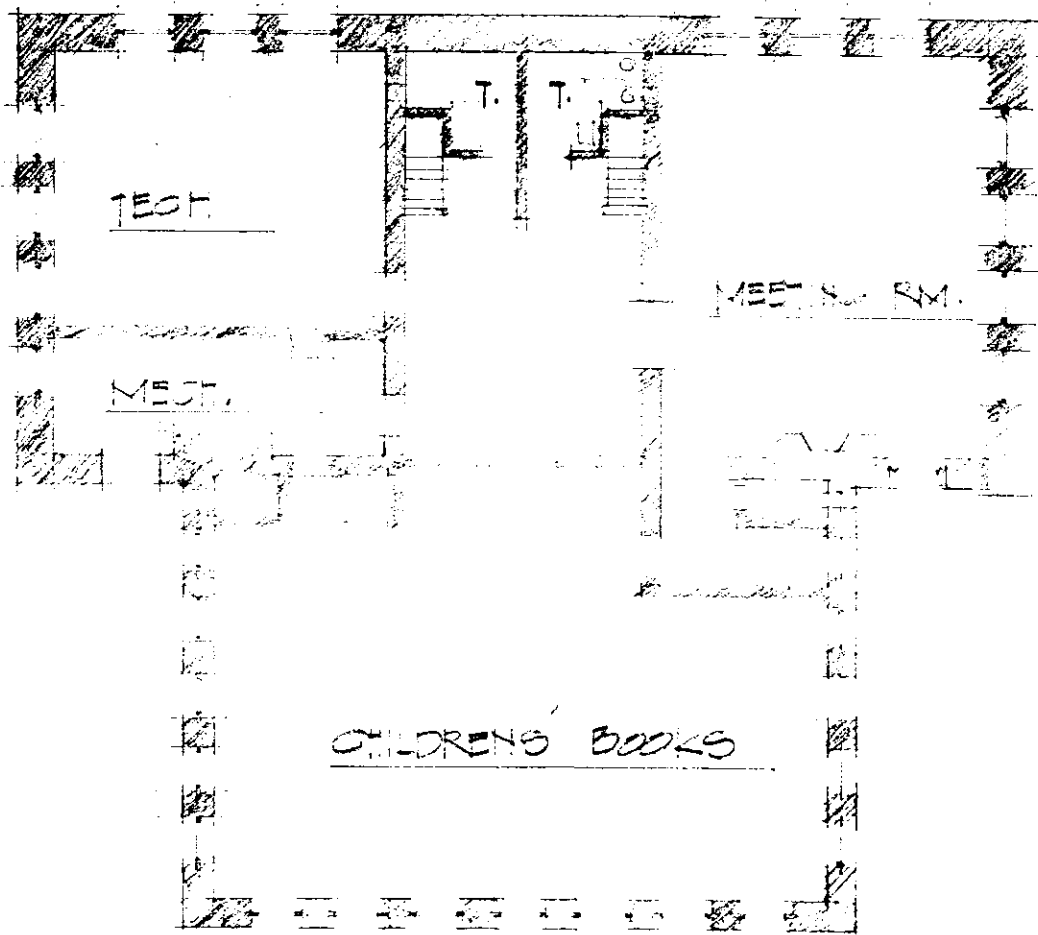

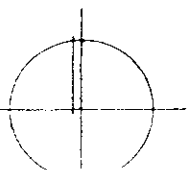

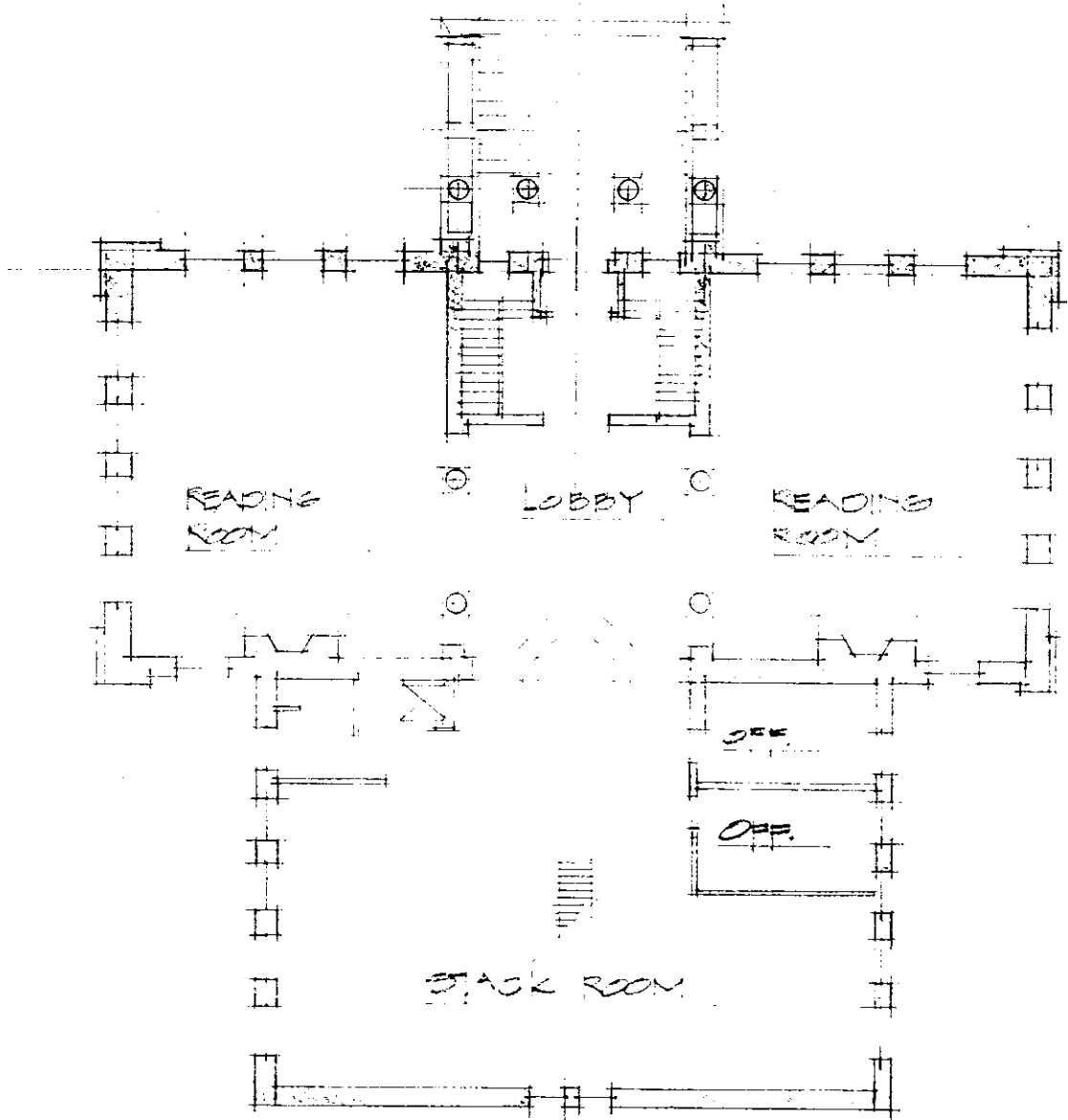
SITE PLAN ● JACKSONVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY

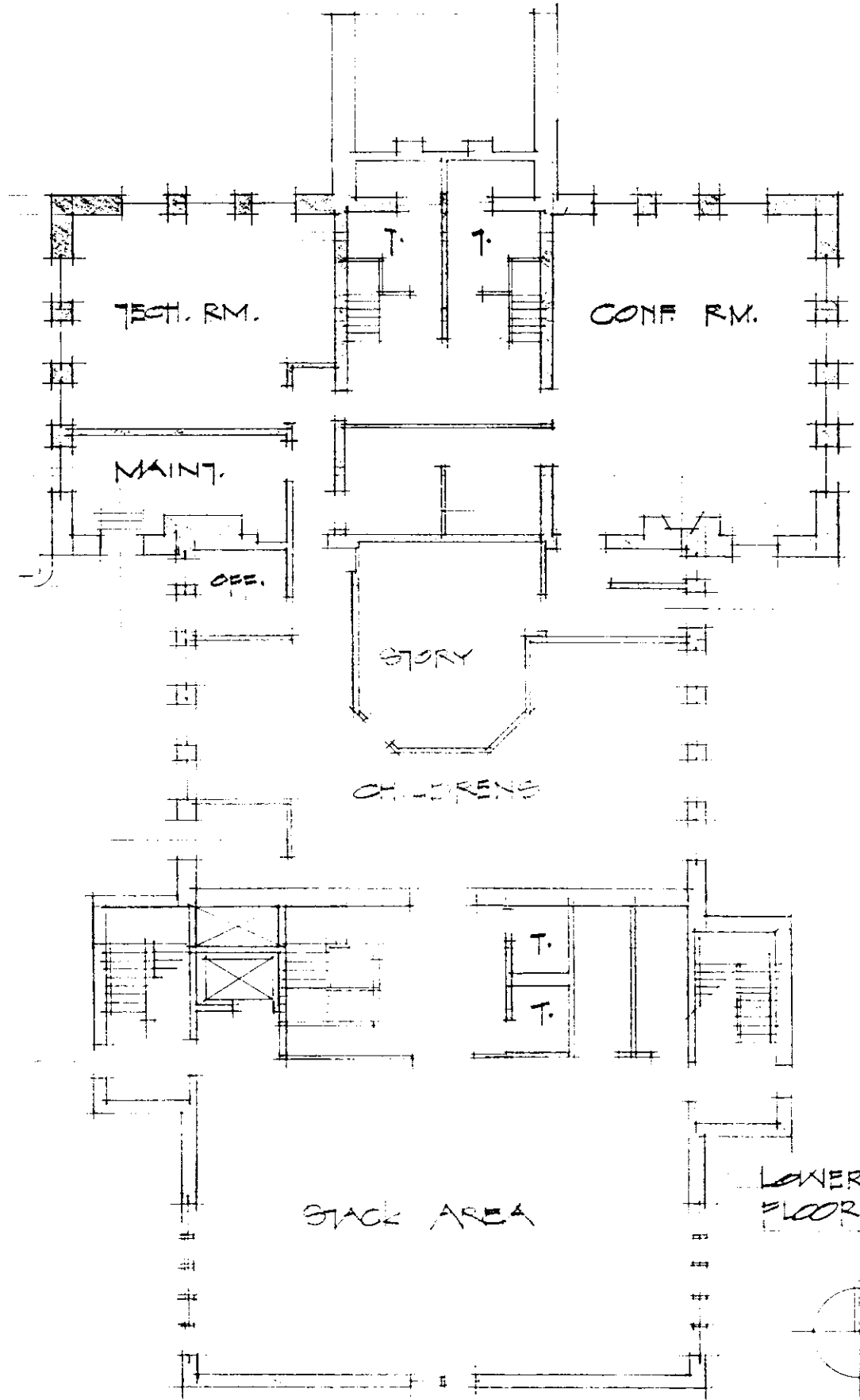


GROUND FLOOR (ORIGINAL BUILDING)

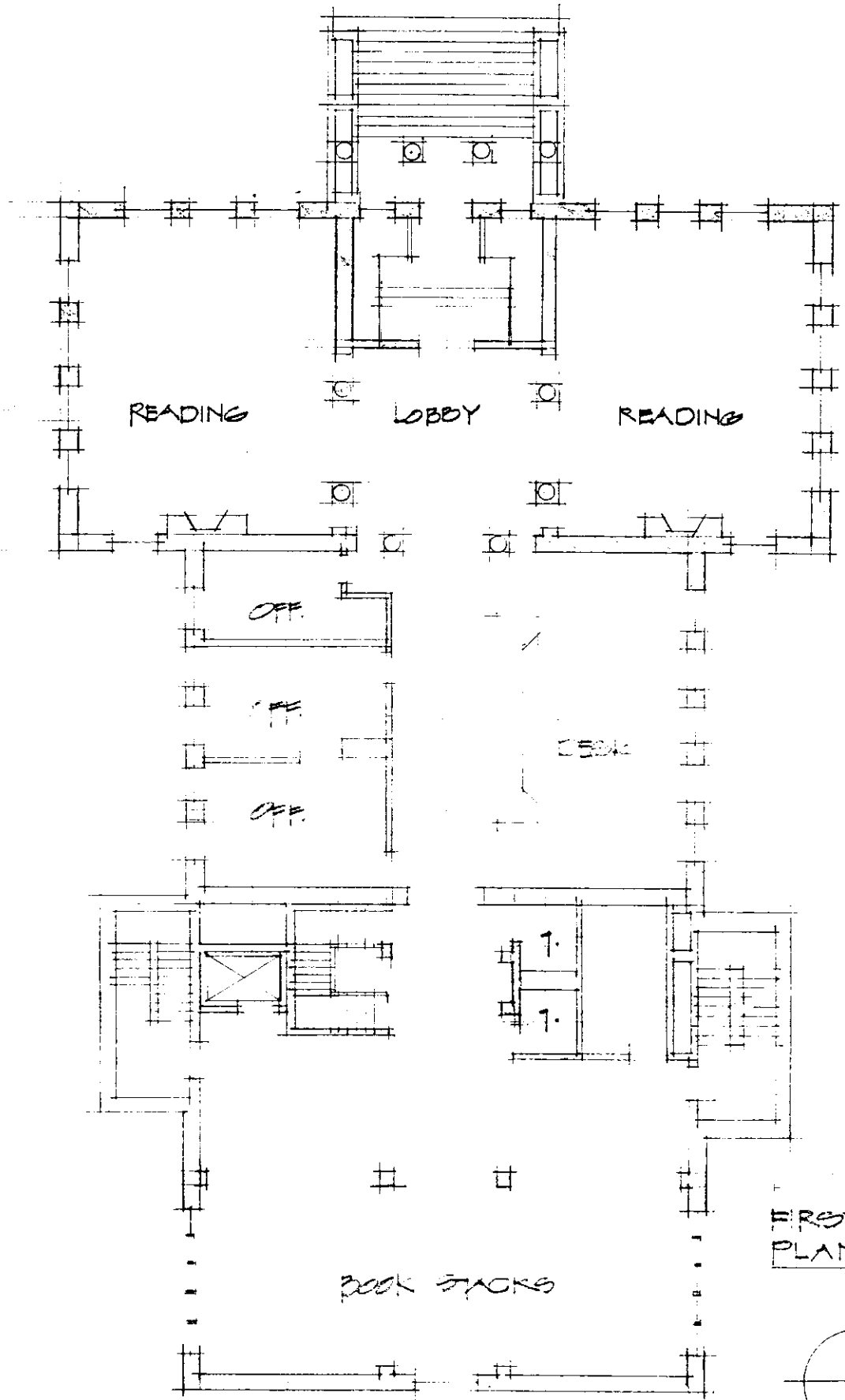




FIRST FLOOR (ORIGINAL BUILDING)

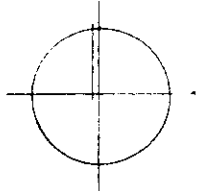

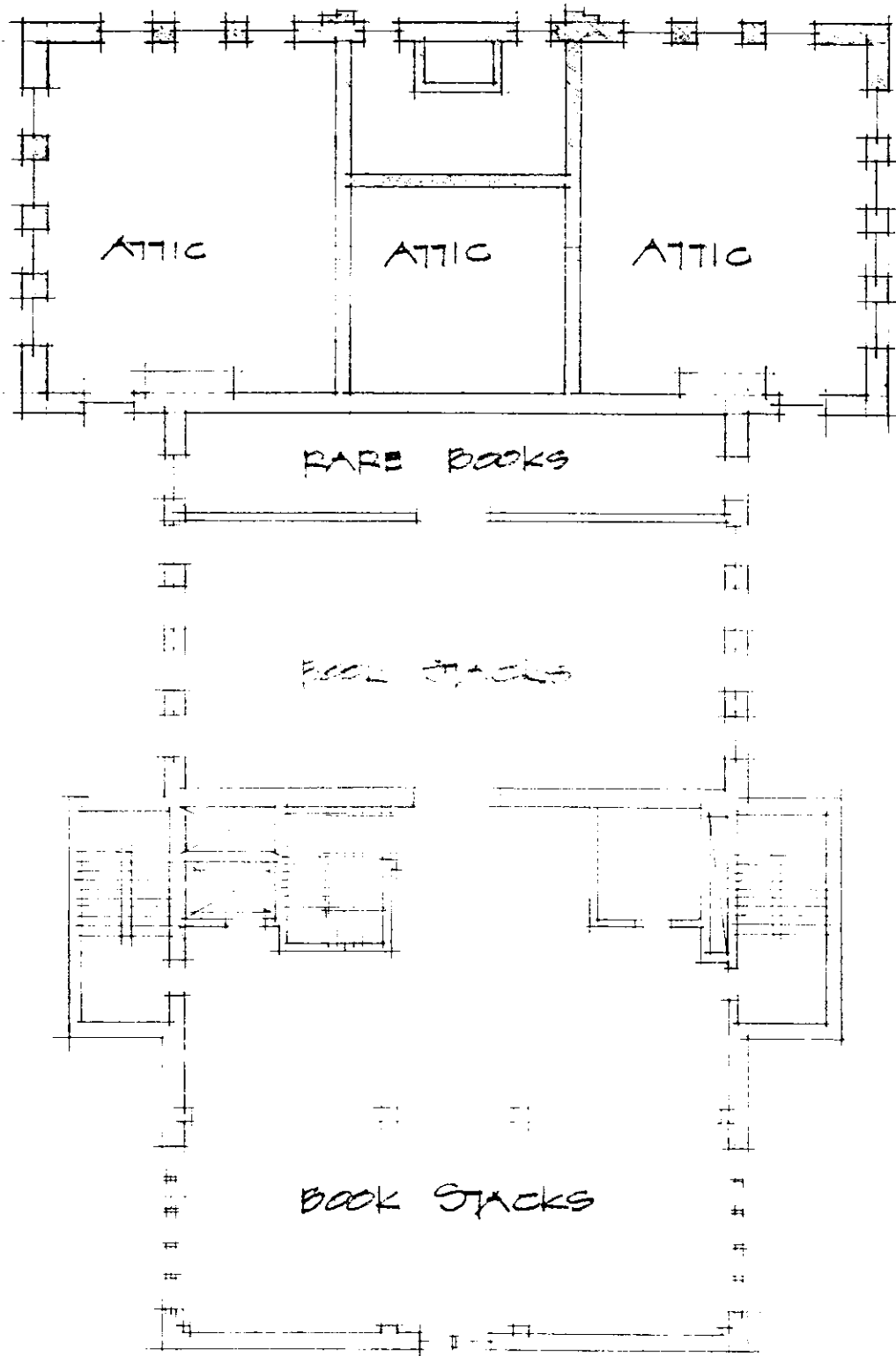

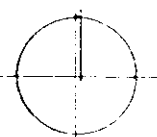
FIRST FLOOR
